The Patrons of Industry who have made a deep impress in political affairs in Ontario, are now occupying new ground in the maritime provinces. They have an organization in this county which met in Hartland last week. In other counties of this, and the adjoining provinces they have made a start and we may expect to hear from them when the general election for the legislature comes

While there is a disposition to sneer at third parties, and to prophesy their early down fall, a little thought will lead us to the conclusion that third parties are exercising the control in the legislatures of many countries. In Great Britain the Unionists may be said to hold the balance of power, just as the Irish party, when united under Parnell did some years ago. In the United States the Mugwumps control the presidential elections. At first the term "Mugwump" was one of reproach; now a man of independant thought accepts it as a title of honor.

Politics are very dirty with us just now. A man sent to the penitentiary is likely to come out more honest than a man sent to our legislatures. In fact honesty in politics is looked on as a sign of a weak mind. The great thing is to get all the offices and all the emoluments you can lay your hands on. This kind of thing may go on for a while, but it means in the end that the people who continue at it will decline to the condition of willing slaves.

The United States is awaking to the danger but they have a big fight ahead of them before they can break down the entrenchments of years' standing.

Holmes to Stand Trial.

Indianapolis, Sept. 12.—The county grand jury has indicted H. H. Holmes for the murder of Howard Pietzel. The indictment is in four counts, each of which closes with the allegation of murder in the first degree. In one Holmes is charged with killing the boy with chloroform before burning the body; in another with burning him to death in a stove, and in another with assaulting and murdering him with an instrument unknown; while the fourth charges the murder simply without specifying the manner in which it was committed. As soon as the indictment was returned the prosecutor took possession of it and it is understood that he will ask Governor Matthews for a requisition on the Pennsylvania authorities for Holmes. Coroner Caster will return a verdict of murder in the case of Howard Pietzel, and will charge Holmes with the crime. Is Jas. Corbett a Wreck?

Within the past two weeks the two greatest pugilists of the present era have visited the city. Fitzsimmons, who is looking for championship honors, was sized up at Hanlao's Point on Labor Day as a man in perfect physical form and likely to fight the battle of his life Oct. 31 at Dallas, Tex. And on Wednesday Champion Corbett appeared in baseball garb. His muscles were all under cover, and while his general appearance showed him to be of massive proportions, many were amazed at the sallow look in his face, and detected a falling away, in his size. Thus they will not wonder when they read this letter from Philadelphia:

"Friends of Pugilist James J. Corbett in this city are alarmed over a story circulated that the champion boxer is not in good health, and that there is danger of his not being in good condition when he faces Fitzsimmons next month. They know that the Australian will get himself into the best possible condition, and that Corbett will have to be at his best to hope to defeat him. A well-known athlete and boxer of this city, who saw Corbett stripped a few days ago, states that he does not look anything like a well man. This gentleman says that Corbett had fallen away a great deal about the shoulders and upper part of the body. The indications pointed to the champion having been a sufferer for some time and that he would become a victim of consumption.'

The big fellow kept his arms in sleeves over the Don, and his actions on the field were remarkably slow when contrasted with Curry Powder, his brother Joseph. Foul balls he let the urchins return, and his best gait was a gentle trot. Although invited to the private concert given by show exhibitors in St. George's Hall the same night, he did not accept, and Irish Moss, hurried away right after the game. With Joe Corbett he registered at the Rossin House. They were dressed in their gray uniforms and drove together in a hack to and from the baseball game. Their stay in Toronto was thus only a few hours.

Last week Corbett announced that he would commence active training on Tuesday. This was one of a series of notices that were sent out, each one delaying the date upon which the champion would begin his work. The day came, but Jim did not show up at his quarters, and left for an ostensible week's jaunt through Canada.

Steve O'Donnell, who, with McVey and Delaney, was holding the fort at the training quarters is following the example of Corbett and doing no training. He says that he has been ready for some time, but had been waiting for Jim to commence. Mrs. Corbett did not expect her husband back from Toronto before the end of the week. A Missing Doctor.

The doctor has been a cocaine eater for several years and on more than one occasion has, under the influence of this drug, wandered away from the institute into the woods.

He was very much under the influence of cocaine on Friday night, and early on Saturday morning was heard moving about the halls of the institute.
