TO PRESERVE FORESTS.

One of the most useful and talented men in Quebec, is Sir Henri Joly de Lotbiniere. In the past he has cut some figure in politics, but now, he is out of the active political arena. In the meantime he is doing more than the politicians, in advancing the prosperity of his native province.

Sir Henri has made arboriculture a study of his life. He knows everything about trees, and he is strongly possessed of the opinion that Canadians should inaugurate a policy of preserving the forest wealth they possess.

A late number of the Montreal Witness contains the report of a lecture delivered by Sir Henri on "Our Timber and Forests."

Canada, Sir Henri pointed out, though we looked upon it as the land of forest par excellence, only ranked as the fourth timber exporting country in the world. Sweden and Norway exported a good deal more timber than we did, as did also Russia, and even Austria was ahead of us. We practically exported two kinds of timber, pine and spruce, the former of which was now mainly found in Ontario. Up to within a few years ago, we alone worked our forests, but now we had got neighbours, who were showing their usual activity in the way in which they were removing our pine trees, as was shown by the fact that, out of 740,000,000 feet of lumber cut down in Ontario last year 244,000,000 feet were exported to the United States. The speaker contended that it was not the cutting down of the logs from which the country derived benefit, but it was the manufacturing of them, and he went on to say that if our timber were manufactured here, we could find employment for our young men who now went to beg for work across the line. We are not, he maintained, either doing our duty to posterity or to ourselves when, having lost the flower of our forest almost completely, we allowed the little that remained to be taken away to the United States in order to be manufactured there, as if we had too much work here. To prevent the rapid destruction of the spruce forests that was going on, he said that the cutting down of young trees should not be allowed. He explained that a certain proportion of forest was necessary to the fertility of the country, to the success of agriculture, and for those industries which required a regular supply of water. He considered that the cheapest way of propagating trees was by sowing the seed of the kinds required and making regular nurseries, from which they could be transplanted to the forest. With a very little trouble there could be restored in the old settlements a great deal of the forest wealth that had been wasted.

This matter of forest preservation is very important. Any one, with the slightest knowledge of lumbering, knows of the awful waste of good timber which has been, and is going on.

To be depleting our forests, without any attempt of restoring, is simply spending our principle and interest as fast as we can, and when the day of reckoning with our creditors comes, where will we be?

The last number of the Outlook has an admirable article under the heading "Mischievous and Misleading," in which it scores Senators Lodge and Chandler for declaring war against Great Britain, and deprecates the loose and violent newspaper talk which has resulted therefrom. "War" says the Outlook, "is an appalling catastrophe, never to be resorted to till all other remedies have failed, and the men who lightly speak of it, and who quickly invoke it, in international disputes, are guilty of a crime."

Each of the political parties has something like rebellion in the ranks. Staunch conservative journals are belaboring the government because of its tardiness in making appointments, and doing business generally. On the other hand, Mr. Laurier is having his hands full with La Patrie, a journal which claims to be liberal, while it advocates annexation and all manner of charges.

A correspondent writing to the St. John Globe says that even if St. John adopted Atlantic Standard Time, which is one hour ahead of Eastern Standard, Woodstock couldn't properly follow St. John's lead, as Woodstock is the Eastern Standard time section about two minutes.

Mr. Bayard or Protection.

Hon. Thos. Bayard, United States ambassador to England, delivered the inaugural address recently before the Philosophical society of Edinburgh. In the course of his remarks, Mr. Bayard said:—In my country I have witnessed the insatiable growth of that form of state socialism styled protection, which I believe has done more to foster class legislation and create inequality of fortune, corrupt public life, banish men of independent mind and character from public councils, blunt public conscience and place politics upon the low level of mercenary scramble, than any other single cause. Step by step, and largely owing to confusion of civil strife, it has succeeded in obtaining control of the sovereign power of taxation, creating revenue into an engine of selfish private profits. Its allied beneficiaries and combines are called 'trusts,' and gradually the commercial marine of the United States has disappeared, the few vessels lately built being an exception and proving the rule, as they were only built by making a breach in the general tariff and navigation laws.

The council of the Provincial Rifle Association, on Thursday evening, re-elected Capt. Hartt secretary-treasurer. The executive are: Lieut. Col. Tucker, Major Hartt, Capt. McRobbie and Capt. Chipman, 71st. The audit committee: Capt. McRobbie, Capt. Smith and Capt. Thompson. Hereafter the regular meetings will be held on the first Wednesdays of May and November. The race was in mile heats, best three in five. After the second heat, it becoming apparent to Mr. Scott, Gentry's owner and driver, that he could now hold his own with Patchen, on a half mile track, Gentry was withdrawn. Patchen went the third heat with a running mate. In this heat he eclipsed all previous record here, making the mile in 2.11.
