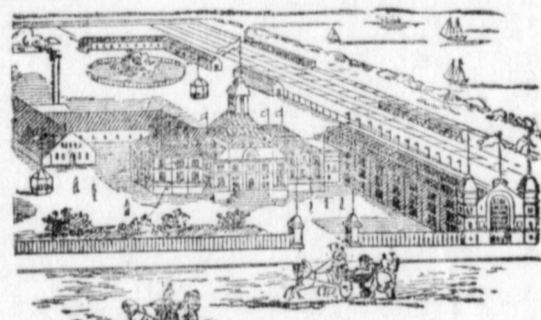

City or Country.

It is the testimony of Sir Charles Dilke that in Australia—the working people of the capitals have excellent houses and gardens in the suburbs, and are better off than the dwellers in the country from most points of view. On the other hand, the population of the colony, generally speaking, gains, from the concentration in the capitals, in education, in power of recreation and in many of the matters which make life pleasant. The effect must be a quickening of the national pulse, and is already, in fact, visible in the brightness and high intelligence of the Australian people.

In America, even the poorest of the working people refuse to go into the country to live. Labor is benefited in many ways by associations; school advantages are better, wages higher, capital receives better returns, ambition has a wider field, where the rivers of people have their confluence. Yet, on the whole, the conclusion seems unavoidable that the evils and dangers, present and prospective of the excessive massing of the people in the cities far outweighed the benefits. Doubtless the chief cause of this remarkable concentration is the natural superiority, under existing conditions, of large centers for all the processes of production and exchange.

For some of the conditions that are operating so unfavorably against the country there is no remedy. So far as the concentration is the result of the natural superiority of the city as a place for business or residence, so long as human nature continues to crave the stimulus of social contact, there can be no remedy until the accumulated miseries of overgrown cities drive the people back to the land. Some sanguine observers seeing the temporary check caused by the present depression, think that that time has now arrived. Others look to the recent extraordinary extension of the system of electric street railways into the country districts, to give relief by making it more convenient to live and work outside the cities. This movement will enable the cities to spread out over a vast territory, materially reduce the overcrowding, and raise greatly the standard of health and comfort for the poorer citizens. This suburban movement is universal, and is one of the most significant features of modern town life. But this counter movement can hardly affect the rush from the country toward the centre, and possibly it may even accelerate it by ameliorating the condition of the city's poorer classes. With these exceptions, the only remedy that can avail to moderate existing conditions is equality in transportation rates; that is, such a readjustment as shall treat the railroad system as a unit and all the people as equally entitled to its benefits.

It is not pleasant to believe that in the future development of our country dulness, isolation, and monotony are to be the permanent lot of the tillers of the soil. It will be unfortunate for our national life if agriculture shall come to be shunned by the intelligent and abandoned to a class of peasants. When the farmer and villager begin to study more how to enrich and beautify farm and village life, when perfect roads, daily mails, the telephone, the electric railway, the manual-training school, shall have carried into the remotest corners, the blessings of the new civilization, it may be that the incentive to live in cities will be largely removed. If the dwellers in the smaller towns and country want to counteract the existing tendencies they must be alert to seize and appropriate the agencies which are now transforming modern life.—Ex.

The New Zealand Budget.

The Hon. J. G. Ward delivered his financial statement in the house of representatives at Wellington, recently. He estimates the ordinary expenditure at £4,331,900, and the ordinary revenue at £4,341,200. The estimated surplus for this year is £9,400, which, added to the surplus carried forward from last year of £180,000, makes £189,400 gross estimated surplus at the end of the year. The government's proposals are the readjustment of the customs duties, and, among other articles, tea is reduced 1d. in the £, kerosene 1d. per gallon, and rice 20s. per ton. Many articles are added to the free list, and an average of 5 per cent. increase duty is placed on a number of articles, resulting in a net increase in the customs duties estimated at £20,000. A free-trade treaty will be entered into between New Zealand and Canada, and a trade treaty will also be made with South Australia.—Ex.

A New Pavement.

Perhaps the oddest pavement ever laid is one just completed at Chino, Cal., says Scientific American. It is made of molasses, and if it proves all of the success claimed for it, it may point a way for the sugar planters of the south to profitably dispose of the millions of gallons of useless molasses which they are said to have on hand. The head chemist of a sugar factory at Chino, Mr. E. Turke, was led to make certain experiments of which the new sidewalk, a thousand feet long, from the factory to the main street, is the result. The molasses used is a refuse product, hitherto believed to be of no value. It is simply mixed with a certain kind of sand to about the consistency of asphalt and laid like an asphalt pavement. The composition dries quickly and becomes quite hard, and remains so. The peculiar point of it is that the sun only makes it drier and harder, instead of softening it, as might be expected. A block of the composition, two feet long, foot wide, and one inch thick, was submitted to severe tests and stood them well. Laid with an inch or so of its edges resting on supports, it withstood repeated blows of a machine hammer without showing any effects of cracking or bending.—Railway Review.
