The Town Act.

The following is a copy of the Act of Assembly upon which the people will vote on the 9th of September, according to a notice in another part of this issue:

SECOND PART.

7. From and after the coming into force of this second part of this Act, the administration of the fiscal, prudential and municipal affairs, and the whole legislative power and government of the said Town, shall be vested in one principal officer, who shall be the Mayor of the Town of Woodstock, together Councillors for the Town of Woodstock, and such Mayor and six Councillors for the time being, shall form and be the Town Council for the said Town.

8. The said Mayor and Councillors shall be annually elected by the votes of the duly qualified electors of the whole Town at the same time, and in the same manner as is at the time of the passing of this Act provided by law for the election of Mayor and Coun-

cillors for the Town at large. 9. In all meetings os the Town Council three members with the Mayor or Chairman shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business, and a majority of the members present shall determine the matters and questions submitted for consideration.

10. From and after the coming into force of this second part of this Act nominations and elections for the office of Mayor and Councillors in the said Town, shall be made and conducted as follows: A separate nomination for the Mayor and for each Councillor shall be filled in the office of the Town Clerk PUTTING UP WIRES.-H. Connell and at least ten (10) clear days before the day qualified to vote at the election and whose names appear on the list of electors of said Town, said signatures being duly attested by subscribing witness under oath. 

When an elector, during the time the poll is open, shall demand a ballot of the officer presiding at such poll, he shall, if qualified to vote, receive one such ballot and no more, unless ne shall, before leaving the polling booth, return such ballot to the presiding officer with a statement that he has spoiled the same and wishes it destroyed, in which case the presiding officer shall destroy such ballot, and deliver him another in its stead.
