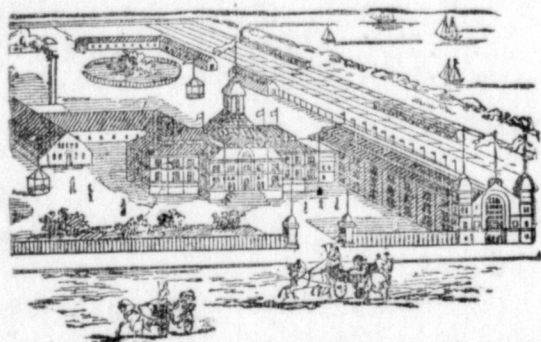

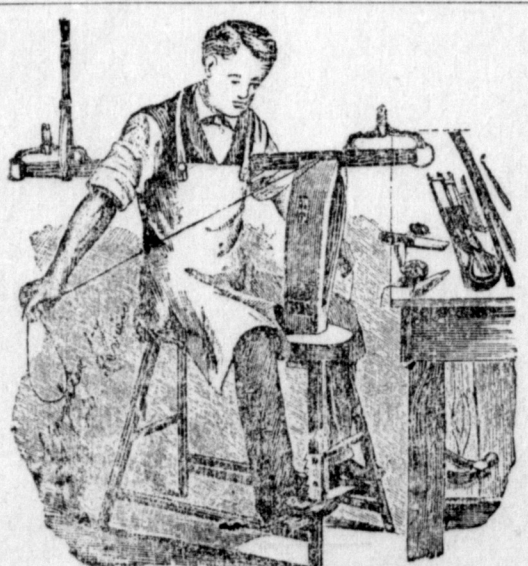

Broken Lives.
 "Do you see that gentlemanly man?" said the C. P. R. official. "Highly educated, occupied a good position on a great railway in England. Is now here with wife and five children, anxious to get laboring work at a dollar a day—anything rather than starve."
 "This is not the only instance of the sort which you meet with from time to time?"
 "Why, my dear sir—"
 And then the official, consulting the pigeon holes of memory, brought out case after case which had the elements of sin, of grief, of pathos.

During any twelve months the company will have doctors, lawyers, clergymen, applying for any kind of work at which they can keep themselves from starving. There are, at the present moment, two doctors, one lawyer, one clergyman, working on a bit of road, which need not be mentioned, for a dollar a day—'navy' work, as it is called in England. They are in contact with the offscourings of earth. They have to endure the coarseness, the profanity, the wickedness of creatures who have been doomed to vice and squalor and the embroilment of the whole personality, long before they were born. Rascaldom and misery, driven to this corner of the world, and culture and refinement sinking to the level of the animal need.

Men with Oxford degrees; professors from German universities; men who have preached the gospel to cultured audiences, can be picked out in the groups of railway laborers, who during the brief summer months, break in upon the quiet of the wood, and tear the shrieking limbs asunder, and make those wounds in nature which cry out against the prose of a strenuous day.

"We are harassed every day by applications from people manifestly gently born, who are willing to take anything. You see 'gentleman' still in their faces. They are poorly clothed; something has happened; but the accent is there; the manner is there; and the hopelessness of it all comes in upon you with a pang of grief."

"The something—what is that something?"
 The life is lost in such various ways. There is drink—that is a potent cause. That has tempted the promising young doctor; it has even got the better of him who has preached the gospel, nay, of him who has experimentally felt its power. And, in a good position, where there had been the handling of large sums of money, there has been the temptation to make good losses on the turf—race-betting being the canker which is eating into the heart of England. Possibly there is a forged note. Again, there may be a mesalliance, which the proud English cannot endure. Yes, there is too frequently a woman in the case, and sometimes that is a heroic, and not infrequently, a vile element in the case, for there is infidelity and elopement.

"But," said the official, "it does not take much to expatriate a man in England. The social code is strict. And when anything has happened in the life, it seems that there is only one thing to do, expatriate yourself. And I have seen so many broken lives here. What a mistake to think that in a new country such people can remake themselves. It is, no doubt, mostly for shelter. Think of those doctors, that professor, that clergyman working with a gang of castaways who have turned their backs upon every restraining convention."

"But can nothing better be found for such people?"
 "Why, you had better ask. Can nothing better be found for our own people? The fact is our farmers are sending their sons to the college to be turned into lawyer, doctor, minister, while they toil away, with stooped back. The land is deserted for the city; the city is overrun; all the professions, all the clerical positions are overcrowded; there is no room for our own people in the cities. Ah, you may theorize as much as you like, but the only solution for us—and it is a curious thing to have to say in a new country—is to get back on the land."—Montreal Witness.

A late dispatch from Berlin, Germany, says:—The leaders of the German Bimetallic League, although to a considerable extent discouraged by the declaration of Mr. Balfour in the British House of Commons that he had no right to pledge his colleagues in the Ministry to a policy favorable to the convening of another International Monetary Conference, refuse to regard the British leader's statement as final in determining the action of Great Britain in the matter. Communications which have been received from the Bimetallic League represent Mr. Balfour as willing to bring about a conference, but he is also represented as being desirous before placing the question before the Cabinet of being enabled to present to his colleagues feasible bases of discussion. If the German, French and English bimetallicists can formulate proposals of the character mentioned, proposals such as would induce Chancellor Hohenlohe to carry out his promise to take the initiative in the calling of a conference, the English Government, it is represented in these communications, will not refuse to join in its deliberations.

The attitude taken by Mr. Balfour is simply the position assumed by his predecessor in the leadership in the House of Commons, Sir Wm. Harcourt, with the addition that Mr. Balfour sympathizes with instead of opposing bimetallicism. The single standard organs, on the other hand, assume that the chances of the assembling of a monetary conference have been definitively squelched. The National Zeitung declares that the bimetallic soap-bubble has burst, and predicts that the Federal Governments will decline to consider the subject further, nor will the Bundesrath waste time in deliberations over the matter. The fact is, however, that immediately after the termination of the vacation period the Bundesrath, which possibly is already in possession of official documents on the subject from all of the Federal States, will proceed in an attempt to draft proposals in regard to a conference. Prince Hohenlohe's latest response to requests for a conference from the leaders of the bimetallic movement give no indication of an intention on the part of the Chancellor to depart from his pledge to endeavor to obtain some common ground which will justify him in inviting the co-operation of all Governments interested in the adoption of a common monetary system. The business of the coming session of the Reichstag, so far as can be gleaned from information available in the various Ministerial departments, will not include any measure of great national or party importance. Contrary to expectation, there is no anti-Socialist legislation impending, and it is understood in official circles that the Emperor desires a quiet legislative period devoted to minor reforms.
