Trade With The Colonies.

LONDON, Dec. 3.—Right Hon. Joseph Chamberlain, secretary of state for the colonies, has sent a dispatch to the governors of the colonies with a view of investigating thoroughly the extent to which in each colony foreign imports have displaced or are displacing similar British goods, and the causes of such displacement. Mr. Chamberlain asks them to furnish a tabulated return showing the value and price for 1882 and 1884, 1889 and 1894 of foreign articles imported, and the reason why they are preferred to British imports. He also desires to secure a return of any product of the colonies that might with advantage be exported to the United Kingdom or other parts of the British empire, and he asked for information as to the quality, price and freight charged that would be useful to British importers.

THE MUSINGS OF THE WICKED IMP.

HE HAS SOMETHING TO SAY ABOUT THE SCHOOL QUESTION.

Religion in the Schools must be Preceded by Religion in the Offices and Shops.—Meditates on Dreary November, and the Brightness of December.



The Manitoba school question has had the effect of stimulating thought on the matter of religious education in schools, not only throughout the dominion, but in the United States, as well. Everyone seems willing to admit that the question is most serious, and difficult of solution. Some people hold that no religion should be taught in the schools, some that a very little should be imparted, and some that each religious denomination should have the opportunity of teaching all they want. When the question comes to such a crucial stage, that the governments refer it to me for solution, I shall give an opinion on the question; for the present, I mean to follow the example of the politicians, and be non committal. I might remark, however, that if we cannot have more religion in our schools, we might, at least, have more of it in our business relations. As a general thing, religion is something like a silk hat; it is put away during the week, and produced on Sundays. To be sure we have a few individuals who wear their silk hats year in and year out, and so we have about the same proportion of our people, who carry their religion with them day in and day out. But the silk hat and the religion are both rarely to be seen on every day occasions. The elders must set the example to the children. There will be mighty little religion in the schools, until it is found in the offices and the shops.

I always feel glad when November is over. It isn't because I have any feeling with regard to the celebrated fifth of November, or that I am afraid that Guy Fawkes' day, will lead to any disturbance among the peaceful and toleration loving people of this enlightened county. But, I think, November is the dreariest month in the year, and I am quite positive that Hoods "one more unfortunate" must have chosen that suicide month to do her ghastly work of self destruction. November is neither one thing or the other. There is no beauty left in nature. It is too cold for bicycling, playing cricket, or tennis, and not cold enough for skating or sleighing. I think the powers that be ought to rule November out, as a useless month. For December, I have always a hearty welcome. It is the month of all months, for it is the month, I am sure, when there is more unalloyed happiness, than in any other of the year. It is essentially the children's month. Santa Claus is being petitioned to bring his generous gifts down the chimney, and the youngsters enjoy the anticipation of Christmas as much as the day itself. They may make all the talk they like about Thanksgiving, but it will be a long time before Thanksgiving Day can supplant Christmas. Then after Christmas a couple of months sharp winter weather, and then lengthening days and warmer suns.
