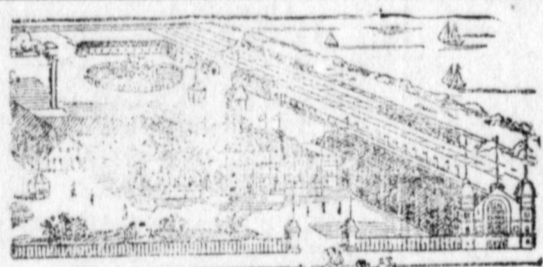

**Government by Democracy.**

The results of government by democracy seem to astonish even the most convinced democrats. In spite of the warnings of experience accumulated in France and in the United States, and also in our own colonies, these gentlemen began by presuming that a democracy would show a preference for those who honour King Demos with an exclusive and vociferous loyalty. They have found, to their intense astonishment, that the democracy appear to like dukes even better than demagogues. The judgments of a democracy can never be accounted for. Where all are ratepayers, as in the United States, a political party can pay off an immense national debt in the course of twenty years and yet lose the support of the voters, or it can increase pensions in the most shamefully extravagant fashion without affecting its position. And in France politicians have had the same experience. After the revelations of the Panama swindle, it was supposed that the thrifty French voter would make a clean sweep of the old Chamber, and elect only men of character and position. But nothing of the sort took place. Some of the most doubtful men triumphantly re-elected, whilst not a few of the most honourable were ignominiously defeated.

And in France the same lesson can be even more easily read. The Empire had left certain aristocratic traditions in favor of ability which persisted long after the third Republic had been established, and consequently we find Marshal Macmahon succeeding M Thiers; but Macmahon had to resign before his term expired, and then commenced the *degringolade*. Father Grevy, one would have thought, was near enough to mediocrity to excite contempt rather than hostility; but Carnot was a Grevy purged of kindness, and distinguished only by the accident that his grandfather was known. Then came Casimir-Perier, with nothing but wealth to recommend him, and now appears M. Felix Faure, the prefect of the ordinary French bourgeois who has just been reproved by the *Figaro* for making his office too cheap by untimely familiarities. The masses conceive their ruler in their own image, and insist upon his sharing their own amiable weaknesses. But among the servants who resemble him, King Demos chooses with the impartiality of momentary whim; and this is recognised today in London. The proper name of King Demos is King Unreason, and that is why his reign is usually short and his end violent. Naturally enough, the revolt against democracy is headed by ability. When a real king appears, he finds all the captains of industry and of the arts on his side, and there is practically no ordered resistance. At the psychological moment, as Carlyle long ago saw, the opposition is such opposition as stubble offers to fire; for King Unreason soon disgusts every one with his rule. Even his own chance favourites recognise their position is not due to their power of services, but to the whim of the moment and to blind chance; and to blind chance and to miscalculable whim no one on this earth owes gratitude.—*Saturday Review*

**Alcohol and Opium.**

It is better therefore, that the communities should not violently interfere with what is clearly an instinct, and should confine their collective action to regulating its indulgence, and deriving from it, in the shape of revenue, the largest attainable amount of public advantage. If, in addition, they can create a check of opinion, or where it is possible, even of law, upon indulgence of excess, they will benefit the race, but beyond that it is impossible to go without oppressive interference with just liberty for a most doubtful gain. After all, the only great abstaining race, the Arab, has done nothing for mankind, while the non-abstaining brother, the Jew, gave us the Gospels and the Psalms.—*London Spectator*.

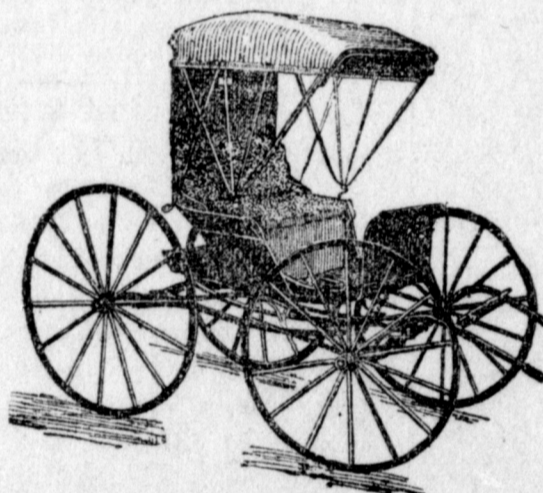

**Blue-Bloods and "Crackers."**

In the Southern States all white men are Democrats. In Carolina, however, the Democracy is divided into blue-bloods and "crackers," as the poor whites are called; and the crackers now so greatly outnumber the blue-bloods that, since 1886, when this antagonism between the two white classes became prominent in politics, the old aristocracy has been gradually excluded from all political offices, until at the end of 1894, for the first time in the history of South Carolina, the blue-bloods were without a single representative in the State Executive in Columbia, or in Congress at Washington. The one class missing today which was much in evidence before the war is that of free men of colour. When slavery existed the coloured population of all the cotton States was divided into slaves and free negroes. The slaves were, of course, the most numerous. There were more than 400,000 slaves in South Carolina when Lincoln issued his Emancipation Proclamation in January 1863. There were, however, at that time, as for several generations previous, a comparatively large number of free negroes, of men and women who were the descendants of free people of colour, or who had had their freedom given to them, or had been able by their own exertions so purchase it. These people formed the aristocracy of the Africo-American race, and a class which stood in a middle position between the poor landless whites and the slaves. They had no political privileges; none the less they occupied an independent and well-defined position, and were an interesting class in the Southern States as long slavery lasted. They were the people who lost everything socially by Emancipation. The planter aristocracy lost its wealth and much of its political power by the Rebellion, but it has retained its social position, and many of the advantages which attend social eminence.

The position of the poor whites was not much altered by the terrible struggle which began with the firing on Fort Sumpter and ended with the surrender of Lee. It was perhaps made a little better by reason of the freer distribution of land which attended the breaking up of the great plantations; but socially the cracker class of to-day is practically where it was before the war. What social distinction the free men of colour had, however, was swept away when all the negro people became free, and when what were known in the South as the F. M. C.'s were socially absorbed in the four millions of slaves who were liberated between 1861 and 1865. Before Emancipation to the names of free coloured people there were always appended the letters F. M. C. when the name appeared in a document or a newspaper report, and the Free Men of Colour were as proud of these distinguishing letters as is the family of a new commoner when the postman begins to arrive with correspondence directed to the member. The free men of colour had no vote at any elections; he could not enter a lawsuit except through the white man who was his permanent guardian, and he could not pass from one State to another without an official permit. In all these respects the F. M. C. was less of a free citizen than the poor white man; but, notwithstanding these drawbacks, the negroes in slavery regarded the free coloured man with more envy than they did the white man who was not of the planter aristocracy; for the slaves shared almost to the full the caste feeling of their owners towards the poor whites.
