

Generally the speakers considered our school system one of the best in existence. One or two, however, thought that too much is attempted and that the multiplicity of studies is too great a strain on the pupils. Some were in favor of compulsory attendance. Organ solos, songs and recitations gave pleasing variety to the proceedings. At 10.30 p. m. the National Anthem was sung and the meeting dispersed.



Text books should not be too rigidly adhered to by teachers. Rapid transit is the feature of the present time. Miss Barker gave a very well written paper on 'Reading.' Reading is the comprehension of the ideas of another and the expression of those ideas. Bringing out all the thought of a passage should not be attempted. Consider each sentence separately. A taste for good reading should be cultivated in the pupils. A spirited discussion ensued. Many of the difficulties experienced in teaching reading in the lower gaades were mentioned and talked over. The plan generally followed is to consider the sentence as a whole and then drill forms of entry. Applications or letters of inquiry should be addressed to the pupils on each word separately until they are able to distinguish them are able to distinguish them.



ven and Hartford Railroad in the section between Winchester Park and Forest Hill Station it became necessary to remove one of one of the largest factory buildings of the Sturtevant Blower Works at Jamaica Plain. This building is 50x350 feet., about half the length of which has three, and the other half two stories. The three story portion was moved about 50 feet east and 300 feet south, and the other part was moved 50 feet east from its former location. The work in the three story section except upon the lower floor was carried on all of the time during the removal, power being supplied by a 20 horse power electric motor belted from the second floor of the building to the main line of shafting. Provision was made for moving the motor away from 'the generator, which 25 Crates Bananas, was situated in the engine room, by placing a reel containing the conducting wire upon the floor of the moving building which allowed the wire to unwind and made it possible to keep the motor running while the building was upon the rollers. The moving was carried out in the usual way by means of the capstans worked by horse power which were connected to the building by ropes and blocks. The building was thoroughly tied in both directions by heavy iron rods before the moving was commenced and though the walls of the first story are 20 in. thick and 16 in. at the second story, the work was done without injury to the structure in spite of the fact that the latter part of the journey was over filled ground. This is believed to be the first instance of a manufacturing shop being moved without stopping the work therein and it is evident that this was made possible only by the employment of electric transmissiou of power.


