THE ELECTIONS.

This journal, Mr. Blair, and a select few were all who knew that the elections would be on immediately, until the announcement was made on Friday. Some time ago we showed to the attorney general the wisdom of bringing on the general elections, and thus saving the expense and excitement of byelections in this and other counties, and it is with pleasure that we note he has taken our advice.

Following a custom now pertaining to premiers, Mr. Blair has issued a manifesto to the people of New Brunswick calling on them to support him, and he lays before them many good reasons for doing the same. Certainly, as far as Mr. Blair and his friends are responsible for the discontinuance of government house, the abolition of the legislative council, the abolition of sinecures, and other reforms, they deserve and will get credit. There can be no question that they are entitled to praise for reducing the length of the annual sessions. The government has also been strong in its agricultural policy, and, in our eyes, this alone should cover a multitude of sins.

It is not surprising that Mr. Blair has a sly hit at the personel of the opposition, and This remark that "individual fitness and ecapacity to discharge the responsible duties of an executive government must always enter quite largely into the question of confidence in a government which is appealing to you for an expression of your judgment upon its acts" is quite apt. If the present government is as corrupt and incapable a concern as some would have us believe, why is the opposition so disorganized, and so weak? In watching the course of the opposition one cannot but be impressed with the ness hours and a competent operator will be in fact that personal antipathy to Mr. Blair, has had more to do with their position, than zeal for the welfare of the province. Reckless charges of individual and collective extravagance and corruption are the stock in trade of all oppositions, m all countries, where governments and oppositions exist.

Hysterical outbursts of such a nature are not likely to cut much of a figure among the independent voters, who demand a policy from the opposition as well as from the government.

TO GO RIGHT AHEAD.

Work of Laying the Sewers Will be Carried on at Once.

An interesting special meeting of the town council was held on Monday evening, to consider the tenders for putting in the sewerage system. The only tender for putting in the complete work was LeBlanc & Ganong, of Moncton, who offered to do the work for \$16,780. W. F. Dibblee & Son put in a tender for the supply of pipe, brick work, etc.

Connell Bros. and the Small & Fisher Co. gave the same tender for the iron work for man holes, flushing tanks, etc-2 cents a pound. Hazleburst of St. John tendered at the same price, and Walter H. Allen offered to supply the work for 1.64 a hundred pounds. The sewer committee recommended the refusal of the Moncton tender on the ground that the town could do the work cheaper. Superintendant Munro estimated it could be done for \$11,725. The committee recommended that W. F. Dibblee & Son's tender for the brick work etc be accepted. They were mum on the question of the iron work. The report was taken up section by section, and the first two recommendations of the committee endorsed.

Some discussion arose over the question of the supply of iron.

Coun. Leighton moved that the lowest ender be accepted, which was seconded by Coun. Smith.

Coun. Bailey moved an amendment that the work be divided between the home foundries, if they would so agree, and he found a seconder in Coun. Nicholson. A vote was taken on the amendment resulting in its being carried by the following vote, yeas, Bailey, Nicholson, Arnold, Payson; nays, Leighton, Smith, Carr.

The mayor advised that advantage be taken of the fine weather remaining to commence the work, and this was agreed upon.

The sewer committee was advised to employ C. F. K. Dibblee as surveyor for the work, and Donald Munro as superintendant. The committee will report at next meeting

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
