Woodstock Markets.

First class hay is worth \$8 at the barn and when hauled to town loose fetches about \$9. Pork, sad to say, is only selling at 4 1/2 cts. and probably won't improve. Butter 15c. to 16c; oats, 26c. to 28c; beef, 5c; beans, \$1.25; potatoes, 60c; cheese is worth 8c. A. C. Smith & Co. have shipped all the cheese of the Jacksonville, Bloomfield, Lindsay and Waterville factories to Liverpool, whither they have sent a member of their firm to sell it on commission. The cheese factories of this county have never bought milk at less than 75cts. per 100 lbs. before this season, and some seasons the price has advanced to 80cts. and even to 90cts; but this year its value has been down. With cheese 8cts. per lb. milk could not bring more than 60cts. to 65cts. Mr. Tilley opened the season by paying 70cts. but after about 10 days he refused this price and made cheese for the farmers at 1 1/2 cts. per lb.

Against Standard Time.

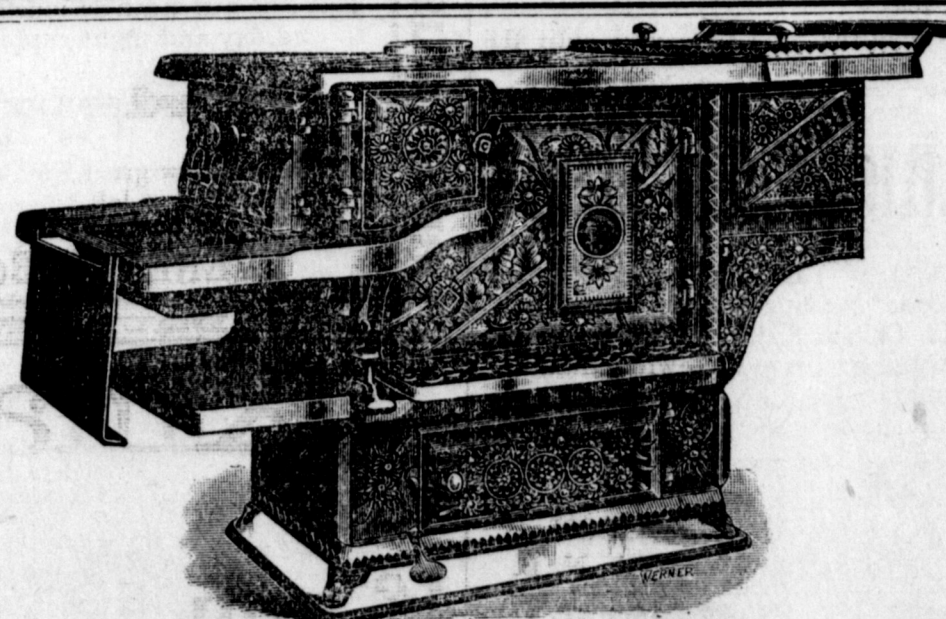
