Tobique Valley Railway.

In parliament last week in reply to Mr. Mulock, Mr. Haggart, minister of railways and canals, said that the bonus voted to the Tobique railway was \$182,400, of which \$134,016 had been paid. A few trains had been run by the Canadian Pacific railway on the line, but the road is not formally opened, because certain conditions required of the Tobique company by the Canadian Pacific have not been fulfilled. Of the \$140,000 first preference and the same sum second preference bonds authorized, half of each have been issued, realizing \$42,000 for the former and \$21,008 for the latter.

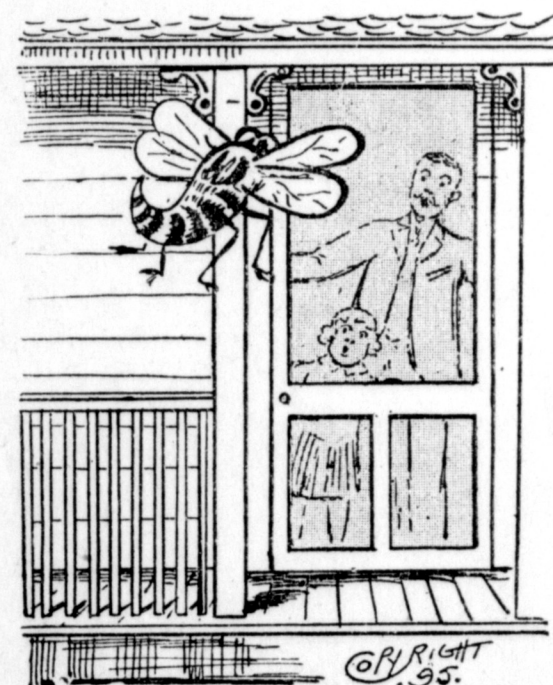

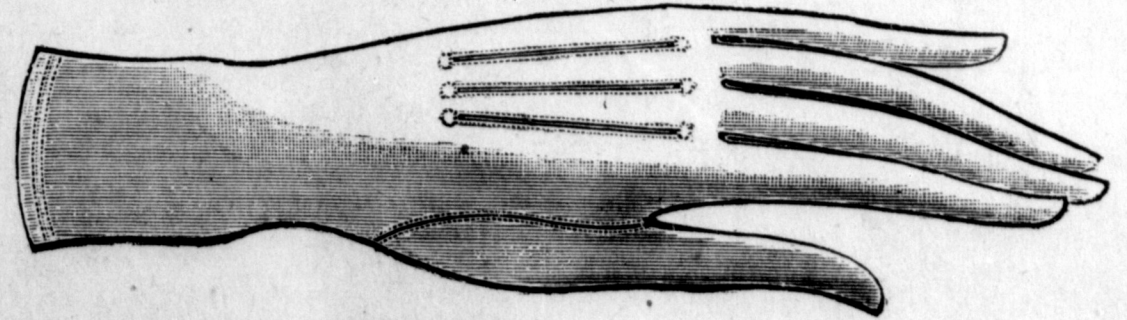
