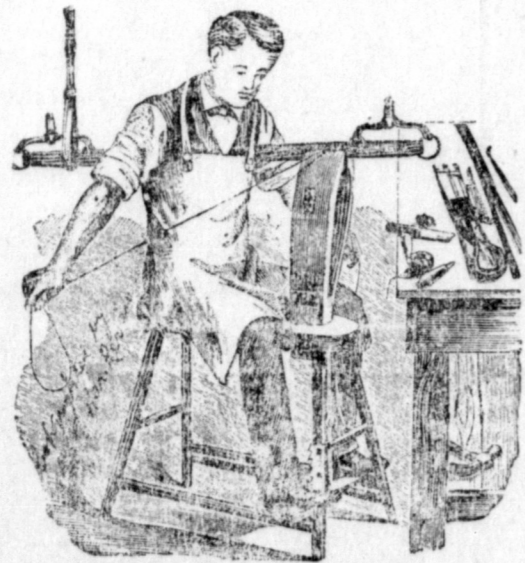

To Build a Cement Silo.

If your site requires any excavation or drainage, see that it is thoroughly done, for no wall will give much service on a shaky foundation; then a good way to build is to get some 2 1-2 x 5x16 spruce pieces. When the site is all leveled and ready, first lay down spruce boards long enough to reach one foot further than the width of the intended silo from outside of the walls. Then take the two spruce pieces above mentioned, nail a board across eight feet below the first one nailed on, measuring from top, also laying a board on the others. Now set these two pieces upright, placing the end upon these boards that have been laid down to receive them. These pieces should be placed 21 in. apart. Fasten to these boards and stay lath the tops. Be sure to make them fast and absolutely plumb, for upon these depends the accuracy of the wall.

Now draw a line from this point to the end of the desired wall and set up two more upright pieces at this point, the same as you did first. Be sure you get them straight and plumb; set these pieces every eight feet around the silo. After this is done get some spruce plank planed on one side, 1 1-2x2x14 in by one half the length of the silo; square the ends and let these form a box around the silo, having the plank reach the center studs which have been placed there to receive them; also having boards across on the ground under the desired wall to fasten these upright pieces to and having the top well plumbed and stayed. Now we have a box around the silo 14 inches high and 18 inches wide. We will now fill this box half-full of stones, taking care not to force any stones into the box that is more than 17 inches wide, but it is no matter how long the stone is. Be sure to get all the stones you can into the box, for the more stones you get in the less cement is required. Any stone that you can get the cheapest is the kind for this purpose.

Mix one barrel of the best Rosendale cement with two barrels of good, clean sand free from dirt. Have your box large enough to mix this amount at one time, and have plenty of water at hand. Now fill the box one inch above the stones that have been placed in the box, taking care that the cement is thin enough to run all through between the stones so as to make your wall air-tight and solid. Then fill in more stones and cement until the box is full. We are now ready to raise the planks and fill again and again until the wall is as high as you desire. In fixing the planks in position always place a shingle or some thin piece against the upright piece behind the planks, and when you desire to raise the planks, first remove the shingles or thin pieces. This will loosen the planks so that they can be raised easily without disturbing the wall.

A silo of the dimensions of 30x15x15 feet in the center, with thickness of wall 18 inches will require 60 barrels of cement to build and make a three-inch bottom which is of sufficient thickness; but be sure and have perfect drainage. The roof can be made as one desires. I think wood silos cost less in the beginning but are more expensive in the end, but it is far better to build with wood than to go without the benefits of the silo.—Farm and Home.

New Telegraphic Machine.

PHILADELPHIA, Oct. 14.—A test of the telegraphic printing machine of Patrick Delaney for sending mail matter was made yesterday. The new system is worked automatically, a punched tape taking the place of the sending operator. Its great advantage over other systems is that over a single wire as many as 1,000 words a minute can be sent between points as far distant from each other as New York and Chicago, while the very best that can be done by other high speed systems does not exceed 150 words a minute. The weather was unpropitious for such a test. The first message sent, however, over a line of high resistance 218 miles long, was received in perfectly legible shape as was every other sent during the test. The speed, which was at first 720 words a minute, was increased to 940 a minute without decrease in the legibility. Mr. Delaney stated that with a wire weighing 850 pounds to the mile, which would give a line resistance much less than that used today, he could send 1,000 words a minute with equal legibility and at a cost not exceeding five cents for 50 words. The system is an electro-chemical one, the message being received on a moistened tape, the dots and dashes appearing upon it in dark brown produced by the action of the current upon the tape. All electro-chemical systems heretofore have failed as high speed systems because the dots and dashes would run together so as to be indistinguishable.

Wheelmen and Good Roads.

It is urged by a paper that it is useless for bicyclists to favor the election of such aldermanic candidates only as will pledge themselves to give the wheelmen good roads. It is pointed out that the pavements are put down by the residents of the streets, that the aldermen have nothing to do with the matter, and that they, therefore, cannot help the bicyclists in their desire to secure better roads. This objection is good so far as it goes, but it does not meet the point. It may not be possible for wheelmen to obtain what they want by the local improvement system, but there may be other means of securing good pavements. Good roads are required for the efficient working of the bicycle, and any project whereby such roads can be obtained ought to be deemed a good one. Because bicyclists use the streets to a large extent and because they demand good roads are sufficient reasons why the aldermen should discuss the advisability of taxing wheelmen to the extent of one or two dollars each per annum. A tax of this kind next year would yield from fifteen to twenty-five thousand dollars. The expenditure of this money in an economical way would greatly benefit every rider in this city, and we do not think many would object to paying it. In making a road suitable for wheelmen it is not necessary to improve the whole width of the street. A strip six feet wide is probably all that is necessary in most cases. When we consider the narrowness of the roadbed required and the very small wear that it is subject to, it is evident that \$20,000 would go a long way in improving the roads for this purpose. A tax of one or two dollars from year to year would soon give us perfect wheeling to and from every part of the city. There is, therefore, good sense in the suggestion that was thrown out by a correspondent in this paper the other day, that wheelmen should take an interest in the coming election.

Action of The Rain.

The rain falling on the rocks sinks into every crack and crevice, carrying with it into these fissures surface material which has been degraded by the weather, and thus affording a matrix sufficient to start the growth of vegetation and afterwards to maintain the plants. The fibres and roots of these plants, bushes and trees thus brought into life, growing and expanding act as wedges to split up the surface of the rock, and to commence the process of wearing away. From this quality of destruction a large class of plants derive the name of Saxifrages, or rock-breakers, from their roots penetrating into the minute fissures in search of water, and so assisting in the process of disintegration. In winter the water collected in hollows and crevices becomes frozen, and expanding as it changes into ice, acts like a charge of blasting material in breaking up the rocks. The pieces thus detached become further disintegrated by frost and weather, and, being rolled over and over and rubbed against each other as they are carried away down the mountain currents, are ground gradually smaller and smaller, till from fragments of rocks they become boulders, then pebbles, and finally sand. As the mountain stream merges into the river, the pebbles and coarse sand continue to be rolled along the bottom of the channel, while the argillaceous particles and salts become mingled with water, and flow on with it either in suspension or solution.

Fast Eastern I. C. R. Trains.

A special train in charge of Conductor Fred Rutherford left Sydney for New Glasgow on a schedule arranged by Superintendent Laurie at 5.10 Thursday morning. Point Tupper was reached at 8.05. The transfer across the strait was made in the unusually short time of 20 minutes and the special, in charge of Conductor Holmes, left Mulgrave at 8.25, reaching New Glasgow at 11.20. The express was passed at Grand Narrows and the entire distance of 183 miles, including the transfer across the strait, was made in six hours and ten minutes, or two hours and 20 minutes less than express time—an unprecedentedly fast time. The special train from Oxford junction to New Glasgow also made a fast run and carried a large number of passengers. The railway yesterday carried some 1600 passengers to New Glasgow, and special trains in charge of Conductor McIntosh carried some 2500 to 3000 passengers between New Glasgow station and the grounds. All trains were sharp on time and the organization and co-operation all round were splendid. No mishaps of any kind notwithstanding the large number of passengers carried. All the trains were run on the block system by means of telegraph instruments at way stations, and operators on the trains. Return specials last evening for Sydney, Truro, Pictou and Oxford Junction, conveyed the passengers home.—Halifax Herald.
