Board of Health Report.

In view of the fact that an election will be held next week on the question of putting in a system of sewerage, the memorial submitted by the board of health at its meeting in the spring, will be read with interest. It is this report which demanded the sewerage system. TO HIS WORSHIP, THE MAYOR, AND THE MEMBERS OF THE TOWN COUNCIL OF THE TOWN OF WOOD-

Gentlemen,—At a meeting of the Board of Health of the Town of Woodstock held at the secretary's office, on the 11th day of February instant, a comoffice, on the 11th day of February instant, a committee of three was appointed to draft a memorial and have same submitted to your honorable body, urging the adoption and construction of a system of sewerage in said town. The following has been submitted by the committee and adopted by the board, and by their direction I herewith submit same to your honorable body, trusting that you will give the matter your prompt and favorable consideration and carry out the suggestions therein made.

TO THE BOARD OF HEALTH, DISTRICT NO. 9, TOWN OF WOODSTOCK, N. B.:— Gentlemen,—Your committee, to whom was referred the matter of memorializing the town coun-

cil regarding a general sewerage system, beg leave to report as follows:—

1st. That your committee recommended that this board forward to the town council a copy of this

report.

2nd. That, in the opinion of this board, it is desirable, in order to improve the sanitary condition of the town, that a complete system of sewerage be constructed, and if such cannot all be done this year it is absolutely necessary that such steps should be taken by the town council as would provide sewers in the most crowded and populous districts during the present year.

3rd. That this board recommend that the town

3rd. That this board recommend that the town council, at the earliest possible moment, have made by competent engineers a plan and specification of the town for a sewerage system without cesspools and with automatic flushing tanks.

4th. That the town council be requested by this board to enact by-laws and regulations making it compulsory on all persons owning property on streets where scwers are laid to make connection with the same, as provided for in the Act of 1886 relating to sewers in the town,

5th. That the board urge on the council the importance of taking some steps in this matter without delay, as the welfare of the whole community is being endangered by putting this matter off from year to year. Very much of the sickness of last year was due to bad drainage. In the report of the Provincial Board of Healt this district heads the list in the number of cases of typhoid fever with 35 better during ton mouths of last year. list in the number of cases of typhoid fever with 35 list in the number of cases of typhoid fever with 35 cases during ten months of last year. Even Moncton, which is situated in a marshy and level country and, from a sanitary point of view, is doubtless one of the worst places in the province, had only 33 cases, while the city of St. John, with its dense population only shows 8 cases. It is only reasonable to expect a large increase in the sickness and mortality in the town when we consider the enormous quantity of water which is being daily distributed on the surface and into cesspools, saturat-Mortgage as follows:—

This state of things has been going on in the town for a long time without much being done to remedy the evil, and in the near future the whole town plot will be so permeated with sewage and filth that it will take many years and a large whole town plot will be so permeated with sewage and filth that it will take many years and a large outlay of money to undo the evil effects that might easily be prevented by the council dealing with the matter at once. Such cases are on record and should prove some warning to us. Your committee, after a careful investigation, believe that a very general sewerage system might be put in for about \$10,000, and with compulsory connection and reasonable rates the revenue derived therefrom would cover all expenses for interest, repairs and collection of rates. This would give the people good drainage and better health, and would increase the revenue from water rates since more baths and closets would be used if there were baths and closets would be used if there were sewers, and cesspools were rendered unnecessary, and it would not impose any additional burdens upon the rateable property of the town. Good sewerage is a matter in which every resident of the town is directly interested and it is not only the important question of health with which we are dealing, but also the question of economy to the individual as well as the corporation.

6th. Your committee would also recommend the doing away with entrance fee and the establishing

doing away with entrance fee and the establishing of yearly rates. This, your committee believe, could not be done without obtaining legislation. If could not be done without obtaining legislation. If entrance to sewers is made compulsory it would be hardly fair to exact entrance fees and if not compulsory it is but little use constructing them.





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
