A writer on the public debts of nations presents an interesting table comparing the figures of 1865 with those of 1890. During that quarter of a century the grand total increased enormously. The only nations showing any decrease were the United States, Great Britain and Denmark. The latter had a debt of \$45,220,000 in 1865, and of \$33,-004, 722 in 1890. This is certainly a highly creditably showing for a country so limited in resources and population. Great Britain had a debt of \$3,848,460,000 at the earlier of these dates, and of \$3,350,719,563 at the latter. But the United States was the only country which made any very great reduction. namely, from \$2,756,431,571 to \$915,-962,112, just about two-thirds. At that rate the entire debt ought to be wiped out during the first administration in the twentieth century. Turning now to the continent of Europe, including Russia and Turkey, which are in Asia, we find the debt increasing, fig-







stained with the record of deeds done when he was under the glamour of Lord Beaconstield, has, since he was himself again, regained much of the confidence of the country which he then forteited, and even among the ranks of the late Ministry there are not a few who regard his advent to power with feelings of complacent satisfaction. He is not the "W. G." of politics; there is no "W. G." in the political arena since W. E. G. retired from Parliament, but after W. E. G. he comes nearest to being the political champion of the day. Lord Salisbury is deficient in the faculty of commanding great enthusiasm. There is too strong a dash of cynicism in his character, too great readiness to cut and thrust with ruthless blade at the most cherished convictions of his countrymen when they do not coincide with his own views as to what is wise and just. There is also about him a certain aloofness as of a hermit, which, while standing him in good stead in some things, weakens him in others. He shrinks, for instance, from meeting political opponents. He lives to himself, apart, a student, a thinker, and a patriot. Except-ing during the lamentable period when he was under the domination of Lord Beaconsfield, he has never shown himself devoid of caution and common sense; indeed, it may rather be admitted that in his foreign policy he has shown a disposition to undue caution rather than to any excess of daring. He has submitted to be squeezed by Germany rather than risk the loss of a good understanding with Berlin. If, as some seem to think, we are entering upon a critical period in which the atmosphere is charged with saltpetre, it is a source of satisfaction to reflect that our destinues are in the hands of a tried and experienced statesman, who keeps his blazing indiscretions for home consumption, who watches over the interest of Britain abroad with ceaseless vigilance, and holds the helm of state with a steady hand.—From "The Third Salisbury Cabinet," by W. not easily be computed for a single year. Labor given this season may bring in results for a year or two after the work is done. Manure on some soils is lasting, and the beneficial effects of some fertilizers are more apparent the second year than the first. A crop of clover that gives a yield as hay may leave in the roots and sod much valuable nitrogen as a supply for some succeeding crop, all of which lessen expenses in the future by reducing the proportion of manure or plant food that would otherwise be required, with the necessary labor. Profits on the farm are consequently much greater when the averages for several years are compared. as each year must bear its proportion of expense, and a failure to secure a profit this year may not be a loss, because there may be a corresponding reduction of expense next year. The best mode of reducing expenses is to
