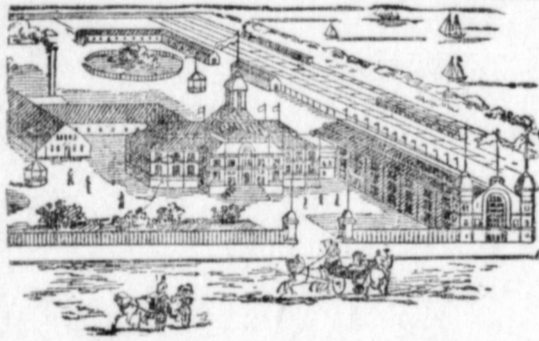

Who Lord Dunraven Is.

Lord Dunraven has done other things besides sailing yachts, but, although a good deal has been written about him in this country, he is best known here as a sportsman. The fact that he is an author, and that he served as a war correspondent for one of the London papers, seems to have been crowded out of sight. Lord Dunraven was an Oxford man, and for two years he served in the First Life Guards. He left the service to become the special correspondent of the Daily Telegraph in the war between England and Abyssinia. Lord Dunraven found the excitement and constant change of life of a war correspondent to his taste, and he represented the same journal throughout the Franco-German war. He has devoted some of his time in recent years to writing on political and geographical subjects. One of his works, "The Great Divide," deals with his travels in the Upper Yellowstone region in 1874, and another is "The Sudan: Its History, Geography and Characteristics." He has also published a book on Irish architecture, dealing with round towers and early Irish churches. He is one of the leading writers in England on the subject of hunting. It was not until he issued his first challenge for the America's Cup, two years ago, that he became conspicuous in England as a yachting man.

The Ethics of Socialism.

The early fathers taught the ethics of socialism as the tenets of Christianity. Said St. Augustine, commenting upon Psalms cxxxii. and cvi.:

"Let your charity attend to this. It is because of private properties that lawsuits, factions, brawls, wars among men, risings, hatreds, feuds, scandals, sins, crimes and man quelling arise. What about? About the very things we hold as private property. Do we ever go to law about the property we hold in common? We draw in the air in common; we all look on the sun in common. Blessed then are they who so prepare a place for the Lord, that they do not exult in their private place. Then, brethren, let us abstain from the owning of private property (or at least from caring about it, if we cannot get out of owning it). Indeed, that most glorious City of God, when she obtains her promised heritage, wherein none dies and none is born, will not have citizens who rejoice in private property, for God will be all in all. If anyone truly and heartily desires His society in this pilgrimage, he will always prefer things to be held collectively rather than privately, seeking not his own but the things of Jesus Christ."

Notwithstanding the efforts of the British Consul the Chinese authorities refuse to punish the Viceroy and other exalted officials who are deemed responsible for the Kucheng massacres. No attempt was made to hinder the execution at Kucheng on Tuesday of the seven prisoners convicted of participation in the massacre.

Arbitration.

An English contemporary describes an interesting incident which occurred recently at a ship building yard on the Tyne, which contains a moral. It appears that a dispute has arisen between the firm and a portion of the plater's helpers, with the result that the men had been out on a strike for three weeks. They afterwards returned to work for a few days and before the expiration of the time agreed upon it was resolved that the question should be arbitrated, both parties agreeing to abide by the decision of a blacksmith, working in the yard. The manager called the smith into his office, in which the men and their delegates were gathered together with the manager and representatives of several other ship yards. Having heard the arguments in turn from both sides, the blacksmith decided in favor of the firm and the man loyally accepted his award, and returned to work. An instance in which a working man from the ranks is called upon to decide a question of this kind and his being acceptable as an umpire both by the men and the employers alike is certainly unique, and the workman who under such circumstances renders an entirely unbiased opinion should rank as a truly great labor leader, and that the men accepted his decision against themselves shows the influence of such men among their fellows.

Pneumatic Water Service.

A pneumatic pressure water supply system for isolated buildings is stated to have been recently placed in the market. The system dispenses with elevated tanks, and utilizes compressed air in a closed tank as a means for keeping up the supply when the pump stops working. The tanks are of riveted steel, and are tested to 100 lbs. per square inch pressure. A partition separates the water compartment from the air compartment of the tank, and a check valve operated by a float prevents the entrance of water to the air compartment. A special pump is used which sucks a small amount of air at every stroke. It may be worked by hand or driven by any available power. The tank may be located at a distance from the pump if desired. An important advantage of the system is that the tank may be placed in a cellar or underground, and thus cool water may be drawn from the faucets in summer, which cannot be done where the ordinary elevated tank is used to store the supply. In winter also the tank is easily protected from freezing, whereas the elevated tank is a frequent source of trouble in this respect.

TORONTO, Sept. 22.—An unusual application was made before Chief Justice Meredith in court yesterday. The sum of \$6,000 was deposited in the Dominion Bank some years ago by Frank Woods under the name of James Brown, who had deserted from the English army in 1869, assuming the name of Brown. Wood died in Toronto in April last, and his widow is now seeking to have the money placed in the custody of the Toronto General Trust Company, and to that end is applying to the courts to have Frank Wood and James Brown declared one and the same person. The bank some time ago paid the money into the court.
