This was a Lively Wedding.

NORTH SYDNEY, C. B., Sept. 18.—A very serious stabbing affray is reported to have occurred last night about three miles from Meat Cove, C. B. At a wedding ceremony at the house of Hugh McEachern a disturbance was created by parties under the influence of liquor and during the fracas Hugh Alexander, John and Allan McEachern and John Donohoe were very seriously cut with

a weapon supposed to be a large jackknife. The cutting is thought to have been done by a man named John Burton Peterson. Three of the wounded are in a very critical condition.

No arrests have been made. The locality is so isolated that it is very difficult to execute process of law, and it is thought that the culprit could not be captured and removed from the neighborhood without the support of a military force.
