BREAKING LOOSE.

Two important events have occurred within the past week, bearing directly on the question of party allegiance. They each tend to show that the snap of the party whip does not have the terrifying effect which it used to inspire.

First we refer to the recent by-election for the Quebec assembly held in Montreal Centre. The candidate endorsed by Premier Taillon was Mr. McDonnell, a young man highly spoken of; the opposition candidate was Dr. Guerin. Recently, Mr. Taillon was the means of effecting a loan, which financial experts condemned, and which caused the provincial treasurer, Mr. Hall to resign. Conservatives joined in with the Liberal party in the support of Dr. Guerin, and the Montreal Star, generally regarded as conservative in its leaning, used its tremendous influence in his favor. The result was that Dr. Guerin was elected by a large majority.

Another significant event is the resignation of Mr. R. H. White, the member for Cardwell, Ont. Mr. White is the editor of the Montreal Gazette. Although a resident of Montreal, he succeeded his father, the late Hon. Thos. White, in the representation of Cardwell, Ont. A couple of years ago, it appears, Mr. White was promised the important office of collector of customs for the port of Montreal. He has not been appointed as the government does not wish to have an election in Cardwell. The other day Mr. White formally handed in his resignation as a member of parliament. He gives as his reason that he can no longer sit in Parliament, while, having the promise of an office in his pocket, without, in spirit, violating the independence of Parliament Act.

The United States objects to Great Britain's interference respecting the boundary between Venezuela and British Guiana, on the ground that it violates the Monroe doctrine, which is, in effect that no European power shall be allowed to coerce any American republic. Great Britain disputes the Monroe doctrine, and says that Great Britain was an established American power in the West Indies and all the great Canadian dominions long before the United States came into existence, and British Honduras and British Guiana since early in the century. British interests were domiciled in America before the United States were ever dreamed of.

The town council and our citizens generally will approve this sentiment from the St. John Globe: The pride of a city, and in fact of a country generally, should be in its roads. Well-kept streets add beauty to any city, but where they are allowed to get out of repair, or are badly made, no matter how pretentious the buildings are, the city or town always presents a slovenly appearance.

The city council of Fredericton has taken a scare because Woodstock sewerage is going to be emptied in the St. John river. This seems to be rather far-fetched. We do not know how many miles water must run before it purifies itself, but we think all scientists will agree that between sixty and seventy miles is quite sufficient for the purpose.

This from the Chignecto Post is not too bad: Mr. Blair with his 37 supporters is not entirely to be congratulated on his success. A noted Acadian member from the borders of Quebec used to loudly commend a small majority at Fredericton; his political motto was, "keep few pig—feed them well."

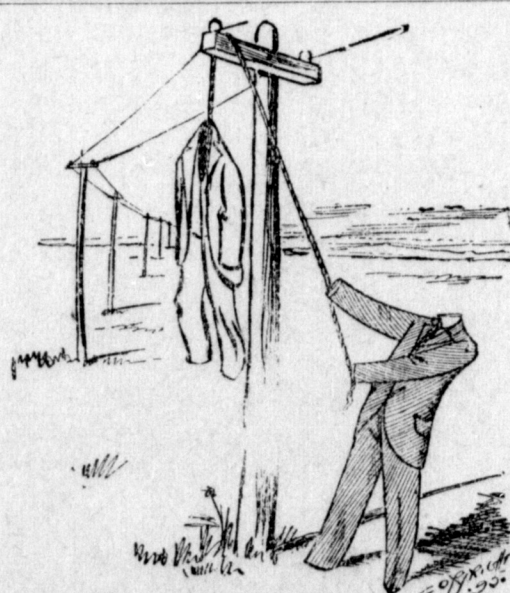
