The Transvaal Trouble.

LONDON, Jan. 2.—The British government, the Cape Colony government, and Cecil Rhodes all repudiate the action of Dr. Jameson in leading from 500 to 700 armed men of the British South Africa Company into the Transvaal to assist the uitlanders against the Boer government. Orders have been sent to Jameson to retire, but he cut the wires behind and the messengers sent after him may not catch up to him until he has encountered the Boer forces, which have gone out to meet him. Three hundred more armed men have since crossed the Transvaal frontier. Germany is very much annoyed at the invasion.

The Times, in discussing the situation in South Africa, claims to have authority for the statement that the Queen has commanded the Duke of Fife, husband of Princess Louise of Wales, to resign his position as a director of the British South Africa Co. The Star advises Mr. Chamberlain, Secretary of State for the Colonies, to cancel the charter of the British South Africa Co.

The Pall Mall Gazette says Dr. Jameson upon receiving a summons to proceed to Johannesburg to assist the uitlanders resigned his position as administrator of the British South Africa Co. and that his followers also severed their connection with the company.

The stock exchange market was greatly excited at the opening, and crowds of people congregated in the precincts of the exchange discussing the Transvaal situation. South African shares were in a panic state. Chartered South African shares opened 1d. lower; consolidate gold fields, 1 1/2 east rands, 7-8, and De Beers 1 1/2 lower; second rate shares were virtually unsaleable.

American railroad stocks were firm; other securities were lower.

It was affirmed on the stock exchange at noon today that a cablegram had been received from Johannesburg stating that Dr. Jameson had arrived there with followers and that all was quiet.

The Globe publishes a news agency despatch from Berlin saying that it is stated there that Dr. Jameson has arrived at Johannesburg and has since had a friendly and pacific communication with President Kruger of the South African Republic.
