THE REASON WHY.

The Aroostook Pioneer contained an editorial last week, under the heading "How the Mighty Fallen," in which it twits the English and Canadian press with eulogizing President Cleveland, as long as he displayed free trade propensities, and belaboring him when he "uttered one sentence of eulogizing Americanism."

The Pioneer, we are sure a peaceable journal. Indeed it says that "we can endorse every word of it (the message) excepting the needless threat of war." If the Pioneer cannot endorse "the needless threat of war," is it strange that Englishmen and Canadians should something to complain of in the President's message? It is because they thought Cleveland too much of a statesman to allow himself to be led into making such a mistake, that the people on this side of the boundary have changed their opinion with regard to him. English journals admire Mr. Cleveland, as a free trader because there is one opinion in England as to the economic error of the political doctrine of free trade, and the economic error of protection. They praise Mr. Cleveland, as they praised Bright and Cobden, of their own countrymen.

It certainly can not be surprising that a mission of feeling should set in when such paper as the New York World says that the president has not only been found guilty of a blunder, but also of a crime.

Canadians admired Cleveland because they saw, in him, a statesman favorable to a reasonable amount of trade between their country and the United States. Above all things, they saw or thought they saw in him, a man whose influence would be used in the bettering of relations of a friendly nature between the two countries.

Is it a wonder that their ideal (not idol) of an American statesman, is now shattered?

It may well have been a question of grave deliberation by the government, whether or not Shortis should be hanged, and now, that as been decided to confine him for life as a criminal lunatic, probably no one will complain. But it is scandalous to think, as some persons have set the people thinking, that his became a quasi-political problem. What the hanging of the unfortunate Riel to the Shortis case. Subsoiling.

After resting for many years the subject of subsoiling has been again brought to the front and is receiving considerable attention all over the world. Subsoil ploughing or subsoiling is the stirring to a greater or less depth of the soil which immediately underlies that which is ordinarily cultivated. In subsoiling the under soil is only broken up; it is not brought to the surface. The advantages claimed for it are that the deep stirring of the soil causes the ground to retain moisture better in midsummer; that it stores up and absorbs the water of the spring rains, and that it aerates the soil and enables the roots of the plant to penetrate further in search of food. Undoubtedly this view is correct in some cases, but not in others. Wherever there is a thick, hard subsoil, either naturally or as the result of ploughing for many years at the same depth, subsoiling will be an advantage. The hard stratum limits the supply of plant food and checks capillary action in dry weather, while it prevents drainage in wet seasons. Under these circumstances subsoiling is a decided benefit.

If on the other hand the subsoil is open, sandy and gravelly subsoiling is highly injurious, as by increasing the drainage it decreases the storage capacity for water. Of course this would be an advantage in a wet year, but in America the dry seasons predominate so that our crops are more apt to suffer from a drought than from a superabundance of moisture.

These facts show the impossibility of pronouncing on hand whether subsoiling is or is not generally beneficial. Generally speaking there has been considerable improvement in crops from its practice in Kansas and Nebraska, while in Illinois and Iowa the contrary is reported. This emphasizes the necessity for each farmer to understand the nature and condition of the subsoil on his farm before attempting to subsoil. As a rule fall subsoiling is much to be preferred to spring subsoiling.

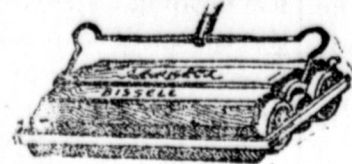

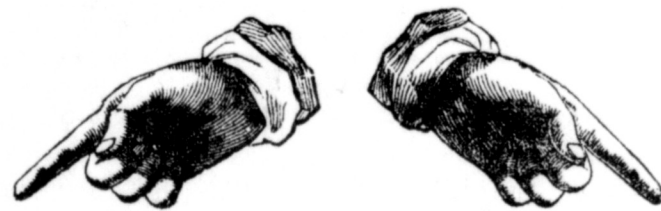
