VENEZUELAN COMMISSION.

Something About the Men who will Define the Boundary.

President Cleveland has announced the Venezuelan commission as follows: David J. Brewer of Kansas, Richard H. Alvey of Maryland, chief justice of the court of appeal of the District of Columbia; Andrew White of New York, F. R. Koudorf of New York, Daniel C. Gillman of Maryland.

The commission is regarded here among those who had an opportunity to see the names after they were made public as a very satisfactory one, whose opinions and conclusions will be received by the American public with that confidence which the standing of the commission in the public inspires.

Justice Brewer is a republican and about 58 years of age. He is a graduate of Yale and has spent considerable time in the practice of his profession in Kansas, where he filled a number of judicial offices. In 1884, he was appointed judge, and was appointed associate justice of the supreme court in 1889 by President Harrison.

Richard H. Alvey is a democrat and a man of marked legal ability. It was the great reputation he gained as being a judge which led President Cleveland, in the absence of political influence on Judge Alvey's part, to appoint him to the position of chief justice of the court of appeals. He is about 60 years of age.

Andrew White was born in Homer, N. Y., Nov. 17, 1837. He was graduated from Yale in 1853 and spent three years in Europe, part of the time as attache of the American legation at St. Petersburg. He returned home in 1856 and in the following year was elected president of history and English literature in the University of Michigan. In 1862 he resigned because of ill-health and returned to his former home in Syracuse, where he was elected to the state senate. He was re-elected in 1864. In 1876 he became first president of Cornell University, which post he filled until 1885, when failing health compelled him to retire. He was one of the commissioners to San Domingo in 1871. He was president of the republican convention in the same year. He was United States minister to Germany from 1879 to 1881. In 1892 President Harrison appointed Mr. White minister to Russia to succeed Chas. Henry Smith. Mr. White has published volumes besides contributing to periodicals. Among his most known works are: The Warfare of Sirrice, The New Germany, A History of the doctrine of comets, and A Word From the Northwest. Mr. White is a republican in politics.

Frederick R. Couderc is a democrat and is one of the best known men in New York. Mr. Couderc was one of the counsel for the United States on the Behring sea commission, and in that capacity he made one of the most eloquent speeches delivered in behalf of the American contention.

The last named of this commission, Daniel C. Gilman, is president of the Hopkins university, is well known as an authority on international law. He was at one time president of the University of California and was later called to take up the work of the organization of the university of which he is now the head. He is the author of the life of President Monroe. Mr. Gilman has never figured prominently in politics. At the White House it is stated that he had no politics, but his proclivities are understood to be republican. The two great parties, it will be seen, are equally represented on the commission, with the fifth member having no outspoken politics.

Raising Early Lamb.

Raising early lambs is proving a profitable industry to those who understand it. The earlier lambs can be sold in the large city markets, the higher the price. The Cornell Experiment Station has made a test of various breeds for early lamb raising, extending over several years. It finds that the Dorset Horned sheep breed earlier and fatten better lambs than the Shropshires. Other things being equal, the Dorset ewes give the most milk and breed earliest in the season. There is practically no difference between beets and ensilage as a succulent food for ewes rearing early lambs. As a coarse fodder for the ewes and also for the lambs, there is nothing better than good clover hay. In fact, this is one of the essentials to success in early lamb raising. As a rule ewes respond more liberally to forced feed for milk production the second year than they do the first, but should not be forced for milk production until the lambs are a few days old. The market early in the season does not require so large lambs as the late market. The best early market commences as soon as the holiday poultry is out of the way, usually about the middle of January in New York. Dorsets may be slaughtered at a somewhat younger age than Shropshires and yet will dress a little heavier. There is no particular difference between these two breeds in loss of weight by dressing, the shrinkage being 12 or 13 per cent. The price paid in the New York market for fancy lambs varies from 30 down to 10¢ per pound, according to the quality and appearance. Early lambs are usually sold by the head, at \$10 down to \$5 or less for carcasses weighing 30 to 40 lbs. until southern Tennessee lambs are sold by the pound. The exact time at which this occurs varies from year to year. Sometimes early lamb market continues up to the last of April or even the first part of May.—Ex.

Grate the rinds of two oranges and squeeze out the juice; cream a quarter of a pound of butter, and add by degrees half a pound of sugar, the yolks of two eggs well beaten, then the rinds and juice of the oranges. Beat the whites of the eggs to a stiff froth and mix them lightly with the other ingredients. Bake in pie tins lined with paste, or in tart shells. These are very nice cold, but if the paste is made with drippings it will be necessary to heat them a little before serving.
