The country may well look with some confidence to the efforts which the Patrons of Industry are making towards eradicating some of the most apparent evils of public life. That the body politic is in need of a thorough cleansing, no one who has made the most casual study of the question can dispute. The union on the part of the old parties to disagree is a fault which cannot be too strongly pointed out, and on which no effort can be too strenuously made in the way of correction. "To the victors belong the spoils," is a motto which was objectionable when enunciated between two opposing armies on the field of battle. It is still more reprehensible in matters political. Yet, we fear, no one with an eye to what is going on around him can fail to observe that the idea that the spoils of office should be all awarded to those holding power is tacitly, if not openly, acknowledged as fair. Against such a false doctrine the Patrons, with commendable patriotism, are setting their face as a flint. The hardest charges they have to face are those implying mawkish sentimentality, and impracticable patriotism.

Patriotism we must have in its best sense, if we are to prosper as a nation. We may sneer at it; we may revile it, but it is the absolute keynote to national prosperity. And patriotism means much. It means self-sacrifice. It often means that the individual will spend his whole life without ever getting credit for that love of country which inspires his words and actions.

The political world is suffering from ennui, or weariness. Men seem to be losing faith in the ultimate triumph of right to the confusion of selfish might. Yet this must come in time or all our ideals of humanity gradually perfecting itself through suffering are too visionary to ever command attention.

The patrons seem to be taking what is good in both the old parties and leaving what is evil.

Their success has already been such as would have turned their heads had they been not pretty firmly fixed on their shoulders. Persons who has the interest of the country at heart will watch the course of the Patrons with interest, and will perhaps be found to give them substantial support.

AN OPEN LETTER

To S. School Superintendents and Teachers in Carleton County.

BELOVED FELLOW-WORKERS.—Together with your County Sunday School Officers, present herewith a list of Parish and other Conventions in the interest of your Sunday Schools.

1st. Let Parish Officers decide the place early as possible and begin at once to make it known through pulpit, press, prayer meeting, post office.

I write everybody, because everybody from national, social and religious motives ought to be interested in the Bible School for themselves and especially for childhood and youth. Especially do we need to have the Superintendents and Teachers. To help them in study and method towards better work and more of it, is one of the great aims of Parish organization.

In some Parish Conventions, not all the Superintendents are present, nor even a word for them, expressing their inability to come, but conveying their assured prayerful interest. We hope not one of these leaders will be indifferent to this series of meetings.—Sometimes less than half the Sunday School Teachers are present. It fails to help the absent, and they go on in the same rut because not valuing the help they could get by conference, prayer, lessons and addressed with their fellow-workers in the Parish. Will the Superintendents cheerfully, not carelessly, announce the Parish Convention in school for two successive Sundays before time of meeting? Will the Teachers interest some of their senior scholars who by training in day and Sunday school give promise of better teachers than the school may now have.

Use the hopeful element from day school work and get them to Conventions for training. The pastors will of course be there. Anything for the good of their youth they want to use and carry it further by Normal class and other means. If anything be detrimental the pastor should be there to guard the sheep. Parents, in many instances, learn in Conventions how to help Sunday School in the home. Let each and all "Gird up the lions of their mind and be sober" on the great theme of these Conventions. Carleton led others of us. We want them to lead now when others are following quickly.

In each immediate locality of Convention perhaps trustees will recognize the close relationship of day and Sunday school, permitting teacher with her senior scholars to come. When announcing say, Bring Bibles, pencil and note book and do not forget the offerings collections. This is a necessary part of work for God. Above all let much prayer be made for God's blessing.
