The New Year came in with forbodings of evil to come. Rumors of war were in the air, and before the year is a week old, the rumors are intensified rather than decreased. It was trouble between England and the United States that we first feared. At the time of writing England and Germany are scarcely on speaking terms, and when they do speak, no one knows whether it will be peaceably or with cannon. Perhaps the most dangerous element in the whole situation is the sentiment of the people of England. They don't want to fight, but get them once aroused, and it is not easy to pacify the roubled waters.

As far as the Venezuelan difficulty is concerned, we cannot but think that time will effect a solution. It is plain that the more the subject of war between Great Britain and the United States is discussed and thought over, the more disastrous do the results promise to be.

Many a blow struck in a fit of anger, would have never been given, had time been allowed for consideration of the consequences. If England and the States cannot agree among the elves as to a settlement of the Venezucan boundary, it would seem that all hope of arbitration succeeding war, as a means of solving knotty questions, will be at an end.

No Britisher wishes England to humiliate herself: no American wishes the United States to doso, and no one in either land thinks there is any need for either great nation to eat crow. It is a troublesome question, but not more so than lots of questions which wise statesmen have amicably arranged.

We trust that the militia of Canada, so far as it needs it, will be put on a good footing at once. This war scare will be a good thing, if it only prevents fellows from rushing into it, to have a "good time" in camp. After this, any man who joins the militia needs to consider that it may not all mean "playing soldier." Nor is it well to feel that as long as we are at peace with the United States, there is no need of militia. Other nations than the American may be at war with the British Empire; and there might come a time when they find it convenient to strike a

Let the Dead Pay the Taxes.

That a man should make provision to protect his wife and children from poverty at his death, is wise and proper, but it is distinctly wrong and immoral, (if there is any truth in the doctrines taught by the Founder of Christianity,) to do them more than that, and to collect great wealth. It is utterly impossible for any man to save, during his lifetime, out of his own earnings, so large a sum as a hundred thousand dollars. If he has accumulated more than that amount he must have stolen it. There is no service which any man can render to his fellows which is worth more than his maintenance during life and the sum mentioned. Therefore he cannot earn more, and if he accumulates more, he has not earned it but stolen it. At his death it should go back to the State from whom it has been stolen. SEATTLE, Wash., Jan. 8.—Charles H. Lugrin, of this city, has in his possession the original manuscript of the report to the British government in 1781 by the commission appointed to define the boundaries of Dutch Guiana. The report makes a book of nearly 400 pages and contains a description of every settlement and plantation in Dutch Guiana, which is now claimed by the British and the names of the original grantees from the Dutch government. It defines the boundaries of the territory claimed by the Dutch, French, Spanish and Portuguese at that time, in addition to a large amount of other extremely valuable information. At the request of Lord Salisbury Mr. Lugrin is about to forward the book to the English premier for inspection by the British govern-


