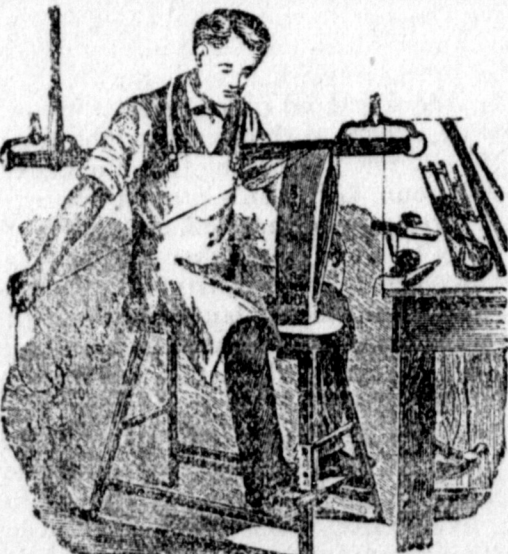

COUNTY COUNCIL.

Summary of Business Transacted Last Week.

The names of the councillors who met in the Court House, in their annual session yesterday week, were given in the last issue of THE DISPATCH, as well as the news that G. L. Cronkhite of Wakefield had been elected warden.

There were a number of important matters dealt with on the first day's session.

Considerable interest was taken in the question of the salary to be paid the Scott Act Inspector. Coun. Munro moved that salary of the inspector be \$400, the same as for the past year. Coun. Caldwell moved that the salary be \$100 and 50% of receipts. There was a lively discussion on the amendment, which was finally negated by a vote of 11 to 13. The original motion was then carried by the same vote reversed.

A bill was approved to be sent to the legislature to provide that delinquent tax payers, pay the costs of collecting, and also a percentage.

On Wednesday morning the council had quite a discussion over a petition from W. M. Connell setting forth that he had done an amount of work years ago, as clerk of the county court, for which he had received no remuneration. He claimed that he was entitled to \$600. However, he agreed to take \$400, or leave the matter to arbitration. Coun. Lindsay moved that the petition lie on the table. Coun. Henderson moved in amendment that the question be referred to a committee of three, to report at the next January meeting.

Coun. Staten moved as an amendment to the amendment that the committee report next June. Considerable discussion took place over the motion of the bill.

Coun. McCollom thought that if this were an equitable bill Mr. Connell would have collected it before. Lawyers generally did not let their private bills run very long. The amendment to the amendment was lost, and the amendment carried. Couns. Lindsay (Wakefield) Henderson and Forrest were appointed the committee.

C. G. Connell had a petition for the payment of \$15.50. He was executor of the estate of the late G. H. Connell, which embraced land in the parish of Brighton. A tax was levied on this land, and in lieu of its being paid, an execution was put in the hands of a constable, who levied on the personal goods of C. G. Connell. Connell says this affair cost him \$15.50 and he claims a refund. The question was laid over until the June session.

On motion of Coun. Henderson the following were appointed the building committee, Couns. Williams, Henderson and Harding. On motion of Coun. Lindsay the committee was authorized to rent any portion of the county lands adjoining the registry office for a year for such purposes as they think fit.

Coun. Lindsay pointed out that the lawn tennis club had the land free for many years past. Another party was willing to pay \$25 a year; if the lawn tennis club wanted the land they might have it for \$25 if not the committee should rent the ground to any other party.

Couns. Munro, Henderson and Lindsay (Wakefield) were named the finance committee.

An adjournment was made for dinner, which was tendered by the warden to all the councillors and several other guests. Among them were J. T. A. Dibblee and C. L. Smith M. P. P's., and Mayor Saunders. After dinner, which was served in a most satisfactory manner by Mr. Treacartin, at his popular hotel, Mr. Samuel Watts was called to the chair, and speeches made by the warden Coun. Cronkhite, Messrs. Dibblee, Smith, Mayor Saunder, Couns. Caldwell, Staten and others.

In the afternoon the council resumed its session. A number of accounts were passed and business of more or less importance transacted. The debate of the session was over the change in the main road between Woodstock and Houlton, caused by the new bit of road which is to be laid out, in order to avoid Mc. Quarrie's hill. A special jury to inquire into the damages to which parties affected by the road were entitled, reported that Mr. Mc. Quarrie should have \$115, and Mr. McLean \$45. The councillors from town opposed the assessment for damages, and argued that it would have been better to have expended that amount on the old road. However, the assessment was ordered by a large majority.

The council took up a practical suggestion made by Mayor Saunders at the Warden's dinner, that the farmers should send an agent to the old country to look into the market there for farm produce.

Coun. Lindsay, (Wakefield) moved that \$150 be appropriated for such a purpose, and that a practical farmer be sent across the water.

Coun. McCollum thought that it would be a wiser plan to appeal to the provincial governor to make a grant of \$500 and send a man across to represent the farmers of the province. This amendment seemed to meet with approval, but further action was deferred until the June session.

A Hint Which May Well be Taken by the Town Council.—Moralizes on What is Known as Good and Bad Luck, and Many Other Things.



Wheres the phoolosopher who said the world owed every man a living? "If I could catch him on the hip I'd feet fat the ancient grudge I bear him." I used to believe the maxim, but now—well, the world may owe every man a living but some fellows have a hot chase to collect it and some aren't able to collect it at all. I at one time took stock in "good luck" and "bad luck," but they are fakes too. "Bad luck" is a man standing about with his hands in his pockets and his pipe in his mouth. "Good luck" is a fellow with his coat off, sleeves rolled up, and a hustle on him.

Its all right according to my benighted understanding for a fellow to fool other fellows; that's only sin; but its not all right for a fellow to fool himself for that's idiocy. It has been the custom of the town council to shave down their estimates to the lowest notch, and then ask the public to indulge in praiseful slobber over them. But before the end of the year is reached, and every estimate has been exceeded, and money has to be borrowed at interest to run the town, the thing takes on another phase. The ratepayers have to pay, just the same, in the long run, not only the principle but the interest, so that it is more economical to make a good fair assessment at the first of the year. It is suggested by some that, let the assessment be ever so large, it will all be expended and the only way to keep down expenditure is to cut the assessment. I don't think so meanly of the men who are elected to the board, but if it be true, why, in the name of the patron saint of common sense can't the town select councillors who will spend no more money than necessary, even though they should show a surplus at the end of the year? Let us cease to play with with ourselves and make an assessment that will pay our debts.

Political affairs affecting the Dominion are in a peculiar position. The Conservatives had a big split, which seemed sure to wreck the party, but the latest is that the quarrel has been patched up, and they now present an united front. It is more than I can be expected to believe, to tell me that all is going smoothly with the cabinet. It amuses me sometimes to hear the local politicians on the subject. For a few days about everybody was an authority on constitutional questions. Anyway, there are two new-old warriors in parliament, Sir Charles Tupper, sen.; and M. C. Cameron. Both have caustic tongues, and it is doubtful if the effect of their presence will tend to increase the courtesy between government and opposition. Thank goodness the general election will be on and over soon. Doesn't really matter very much which party is in power? Judge from one's own experience. How many young men, starting in life, take one side or other, as it seems best for their business? Is it not customary for them to find out whether it will pay best to be a Tory or a Grit?
