IN HIS DELICATE WAY DISCUSSES SOCIAL GATHERINGS.

Has Some Mild Criticism for the Professional Temperance Society.-Thinks They are not Always Genuine.-Tells a Little Story with an Election Moral.



and must animal needs herd with other men in socities but why in Carleton county so many people gather together in secret temperance societies is past my finding out. In looking at

the matter of these societies in the rural districts I find that they are not organized with any zeal for the cause of temperance nor any desire to prevent the young men (or women) from being destroyed by strong drink. They arise in this way. When winter draws nigh and the evenings commence to lengthen out, the young people having no places of amusement to which they can resort, are open for almost anything that will gather a crowd and produce some diverson. A paid organizer of temperance lodges puts in an appearance, enlists the interest of the girls and of the men who do not drink and never thought of it. A lodge is started, and the young men who do drink on occasions, rather than be left out in the cold take the oath, pay their dues, and become members. The proceedings of the lodge are mysterious and in some cases rather ludicrous. The organization being completed, the question of temperance promptly takes a back seat. The members arrange themselves on two sides under their leaders and a contest commences. The nature of this contest differs in different localities but I will speak of what I know. Each faction undertakes to entertain the society on alternate nights: judges are appointed; a schedule of credits is arranged and the contest opens. Debates, readings, recitations, music, the production of original essays and poems punctuated with quarrels, occupy the time. One of the terms of the contest is that the loosing side shall treat the crowd at the end of the season. Of course this thing is good and useful, but the utter folly of calling it temperance is what paralyzes me. The question of temperance is so far sunk from view in the meetings that the young men scarcely think of it and all the difference their membership makes in them is that they drink only on the very quiet. So far is temperance lost sight of that a case is on record where a young man presented for membership at a lodge was black beaned by one faction, because his admission would count the other faction 100 points in the contest. Social organizations are necessary to the well being of any community but an organization that lives under false pretenses can not be an unmitigated good. Instead of a mock temperance society of this sort a community might organize a debating club, a local improvement society, or some other sort of club where persons of all political parties and all religious beliefs might meet and find entertainment and enlightenment.
