TOWN AND COUNTY

The opening of the New Year will find the people of Woodstock, and of the County of Carleton interested in municipal politics. Tomorrow will be the day for nomination of Mayor and councillors to serve the town of Woodstock. As the town has many important matters to be dealt with during the coming year, it will be necessary, for the good government of the town that a choice of good men be made.

The county is through its biennial election, and its newly elected servants will meet in deliberation within a few days. The personnel of the council is a good deal changed. We do not know that there are any weighty subjects to be discussed in this coming session, although matters of more or less serious import are likely to come to the front before the session is over.

County matters are of great importance to those outside the limits of the town, and the course of action which the present council will take, must be followed with interest by several thousands of people. The following is timely, from the Brockville Times:—Assuredly this is the silly season, or why all this buncombe and fussing about war between England and the United States? These two closely related English speaking nations have everything to lose and nothing to gain by a contest. Both are essentially a nation of shopkeepers, and are certainly not going to be dragged into a fool's errand over a boundary dispute in South America by a mob of braying politicians who periodically become hysterically rabid about election time. Someone ought to turn the sense of common sense upon these long-eared chasses who trying to spoil the Christmas festivities of decent people.

New Uses Of Aluminum.

Although aluminum has disappointed some of the brilliant expectations aroused by the discovery of cheaper methods of producing the metal, yet many new and important uses are being found for it. One of the most recent is the employment of this exceedingly light metal for the powder chamber of cartridges, thus enabling a soldier to carry 25 per cent. more ammunition without increase of weight. Another comparatively new use for aluminum is in the making of oil-cups for the high speed locomotives. Formerly these oil-cups made of copper, were frequently broken by the tremendous centrifugal force developed as they were whirled around. The aluminum cups weigh two-thirds less than these of copper, and consequently having less momentum, can stand strain. Baggage checks, shoe-pegs, cooking utensils and other articles in which lightness is desirable, are now made in large numbers of aluminum. Since aluminum gives off sparks when struck, its employment for metal work in powder mills has proved a source of greater safety.

Manitoba Elections. A general election for the province of Manitoba will be held on the 15th of January, and the new house will meet for the transaction of business on the 24th. Mr. Greenway, the premier, has issued an address to his own constituents, which may be taken as an expression of the views contained in the reply to the Ottawa government. He says: Gentlemen,—For the seventh time during a period extending over little more than sixteen years, I have the honor of soliciting your suffrages. During these years I have been honored with your confidence, and I now appeal to you with greater confidence than before. The menacing attitude assumed by the Dominion government with reference to the educational legislation of the province has made it necessary to take the sense of the electors upon the question thus forced upon them. On the 21st of March last, the Dominion Privy Council hastily issued a remedial order which commanded the legislature of Manitoba to restore the separate school system as it existed prior to 1890. To this the legislature declined to assent. On the 8th day of July last the Honorable Mr. Foster, speaking for the Dominion government in the House of Commons, stated that a communication would be sent to the Manitoba government to ascertain whether a settlement of the school question could be made, and that in the event of refusal, a session of the Dominion parliament would be called to meet not later than the 1st Thursday of January next, when the Dominion government would introduce and press to a conclusion such legislation as would afford an adequate measure of relief, based upon the lines of the judgment of the Imperial Privy Council and the remedial order on the 21st of March, 1895.

A similar statement was made about the same time in the Senate by Sir McKenzie Bowell, Premier of the Dominion. From the utterances of the members of the Dominion cabinet and from facts known to all who have watched the controversy it is clear that nothing short of a separate denominational system of schools will be accepted as an adequate measure of relief. To the communication forwarded in pursuance of the above announcement by the Dominion government on the 27th of July last, inviting the Manitoba government to take such action as would remedy the alleged grievances of the minority we have replied definitely and positively rejecting the proposal to re-establish separate schools in any form, and expressing our intention to uphold the present uniform non-sectarian system. As the federal parliament is about to be asked to legislate upon this subject, it is of the utmost importance that the views of the electors of the province should be clearly and unmistakably expressed. I assert that our people are perfectly competent to deal with their own educational concerns, and I resent the imputation that they have treated any portion of the community with injustice, or in a spirit of intolerance. I protest against the proposed action of the Dominion government in inviting parliament to destroy our national school system without investigation, and in ignorance of the circumstances. If your votes are overwhelmingly in favor of the stand taken by my government there is no doubt that the views of members of the Dominion parliament will be materially affected thereby, and coercive legislation may be altogether averted. In comparison with this momentous issue, other questions which have hitherto been much discussed have for the present taken a secondary position in the public mind. After referring to the prohibition question, Mr. Greenway touches on the subject of freight rates, and concludes: "I ask you, in conclusion, to remember that the main issue from which you are to pronounce is a most important one. "Shall the people of Manitoba submit without protest to unjust and overbearing treatment? "Shall provincial autonomy be practically abandoned? "Shall our national school system be destroyed? "These are questions, gentlemen, which you are required to answer by the exercise of your franchise."

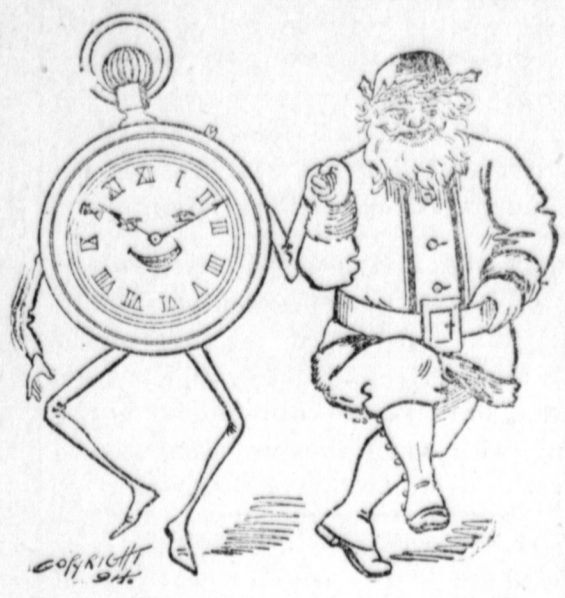

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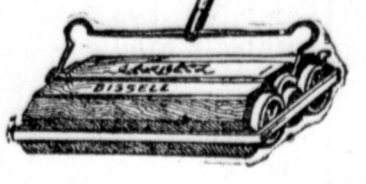
