## Annual Meeting.

The annual meeting of the St. John River  
Log Driving Company was held at the Queen  
Hotel in Fredericton, on the 1st inst. The  
following directors were elected; W. H.  
Murray, B. W. Mallett, D. H. Nixon, F. H.  
Hale, J. A. Morrison. At a subsequent meet-  
ing of the directors W. H. Murray was elected  
president and J. Fraser Gregory, secretary-  
treasurer. The log driving contract with Fred  
Moore was talked over, but no new action was  
decided on with reference thereto. Accord-  
ing to estimates made by prominent lum-  
bermen there were cut on the St. John river  
above Nashwaak last winter one hundred and  
ten million spruce, twelve million cedar, and  
six million pine. The total cut on the Mira-  
michi aggregates one hundred million and on  
the Restigouche about seventy million, same  
as last year.

The F'ton Herald says:—The question of  
damages sustained on account of an alleged  
non-fulfilment of the driving contract last  
season, by the Messrs. Moore, came up and  
was discussed at some length. It was finally  
decided to submit to the board of directors  
the names of four gentlemen from which to  
select an arbitrator to represent the log driv-  
ers, at a proposed arbitration which is to be  
held to settle the matter. The gentlemen  
named were William Richards, Boiestown;  
D. McLeod Vince, Woodstock; D. B. Warner,  
St. John and L. C. Sterns, Fort Kent.

It is understood that the amount of dam-  
ages claimed to have been sustained by log  
owners as a result of last season's driving  
operations is in the vicinity of \$135,000. Of  
course the value of the logs caught below the  
corporation limits will have to be deducted  
from this amount. The Messrs. Moore will  
have the privilege of selecting one of the arbi-  
trators, and the two chosen will select a  
third. The case promises to be an interest-  
ing one, and the outcome of it will be eagerly  
watched for by lumbermen.

## Dr. Parkhurst on College Athletics.

Dr. Parkhurst, in his article to young men  
in the 'Ladies' Home Journal,' writes very  
forcibly upon the necessity of physical  
development as a requisite for proper mental  
growth—the development of the body and  
mind—and says relative to college athletics:  
"It is, therefore, encouraging that  
our schools and colleges are making physical  
culture obligatory; and the encouragement  
lies less in what such institutions have al-  
ready done in the way of cultivating the  
body than it does in their making it part of  
academic confession of faith that a man can  
never altogether get over being an animal,  
that there is no inconsistency between intelli-  
gence and dust, and that the more a man  
wants to make of himself in the upper strata  
of human possibility the more careful he  
must be to keep in wholesome condition of  
repair the platform of tissue and blood  
corpuscle, into which, as so much bud into  
so much stock, later unfoldings are insepar-  
ably knit. I should be sorry to have this in-  
terpreted as an approval of all or nearly all  
of what passes under the name of college  
athletics. It is one thing to train the body  
for the sake of the man, and it is another  
thing to train the body for the sake of the  
body. I regret that there is so much tendency  
among college authorities to shape the  
physical curriculum to the end of producing  
physical experts—football, baseball, rowing  
match professionals. That kind of a thing is  
a craze at present, and it is a pity that among  
our college presidents and professors so  
many have so far succumbed to the mania as  
to be willing to endorse it as a form of ad-  
vertisement and as a drawing card."

general election for the federal parliament  
will be held in the month of June. The  
following table showing the results of the  
various general elections since the formation  
of the Dominion will be interesting to have  
on hand.

The first election was held in September, 1867,  
Confederation being the issue. The election re-

The last general election was held on  
March 5, 1891, when the government of Sir  
John Macdonald was sustained by a some-  
what reduced majority, increased by sub-  
sequent bye-elections.

Four premiers have died since then, Sir  
John Macdonald, Hon. Alex. Mackenzie, Sir  
John Abbott and Sir John Thompson.

This approaching election will be the first  
since Confederation in which Sir John A.  
Macdonald did not play a leading part.

## Lumbermen in Hard Luck.

Quebec, April 2.—Several of the Quebec  
lumber merchants, now in England to make  
contracts for summer shipments of lumber  
from Canada, cable that the English demand  
for Canadian lumber is better than last year,  
and that prospects are promising for a fairly  
active business season. On the other hand,  
there is some fear here that shippers may  
have difficulty in filling their English orders  
on account of the prospect of a short supply  
of logs at most of the mills. The "cut" of  
logs in Canadian woods, and especially in the  
Ottawa district, has been as large as usual,  
but the winter has been a most unfavorable  
one for getting the logs out of the forest.  
During the first part of the season there was  
not sufficient snow for logging, and within  
the last few weeks there has been such a  
continual succession of storms that it has  
been virtually impossible to keep bush roads  
open to draw out logs in such a depth of snow.  
The water of the streams will, doubtless,  
therefore, be too low for successful driving  
of logs before they can be got together in  
them. This is unfortunate for Canadian  
lumbermen, for last year, when lumber was  
plentiful here, the market was inactive, and  
there was a break in the prices of all but  
superior grades. The English market is  
limited and conservative, easily overstocked  
and demoralized, and takes only the best  
qualities of timber and lumber.

The principal market for Canadian lumber  
is in the United States, and any overstock-  
ing or depression in that market is immedi-  
ately felt by Canadian lumbermen. This  
market has become enormously overstocked  
with inferior grades produced in western  
Ontario, during the last and present seasons,  
the result being that Canada's western lum-  
ber trade is in a thoroughly demoralized  
condition, aided by the increasing quantities  
of Southern pine cut each year, which is  
finding a market farther and farther north,  
until now, it is competing with Ontario  
coarse lumber in the United States as far  
north as the south shore of Lake Ontario.
