



A VERY handsome monumental piece of work has just been turned out of the shop of J. Gallagher & Son, and is now erected in the Catholic cemetery at Debec. It is a memorial to the late Geo. It stands on a base 2 feet 6 inches square, upon which rests another base having the word O'Donnell carved in large letters. 
