A VERY handsome monumental piece of work has just been turned out of the shop of J. Gallagher & Son, and is now erected in the Catholic cemetery at Debec. It is a memorial to the late Geo. O'Donnell the well-known lumberman who died last spring. The work is done in Italian marble, and stands eleven feet from the ground. It stands on a base 2 feet 6 inches square, upon which rests another base having the word O'Donnell carved in large letters. The die is of good proportion and bears the inscription "George O'Donnell died May 17th 1896, age 57." Over the die is the cap, and on top of that the plinth, the whole being surmounted by a cross prettily gotten up in rustic work. This monument is probably the handsomest ever turned out in this town. Its total cost was \$300.

Mr. James Hayden lies very ill at a relative's house on White St., St. John. He is in the city undergoing treatment for a dangerous disease of the throat. Last week work was received that Mr. Hayden was very low. Later reports are that his condition is extremely critical, but no immediate change for the worse is anticipated. 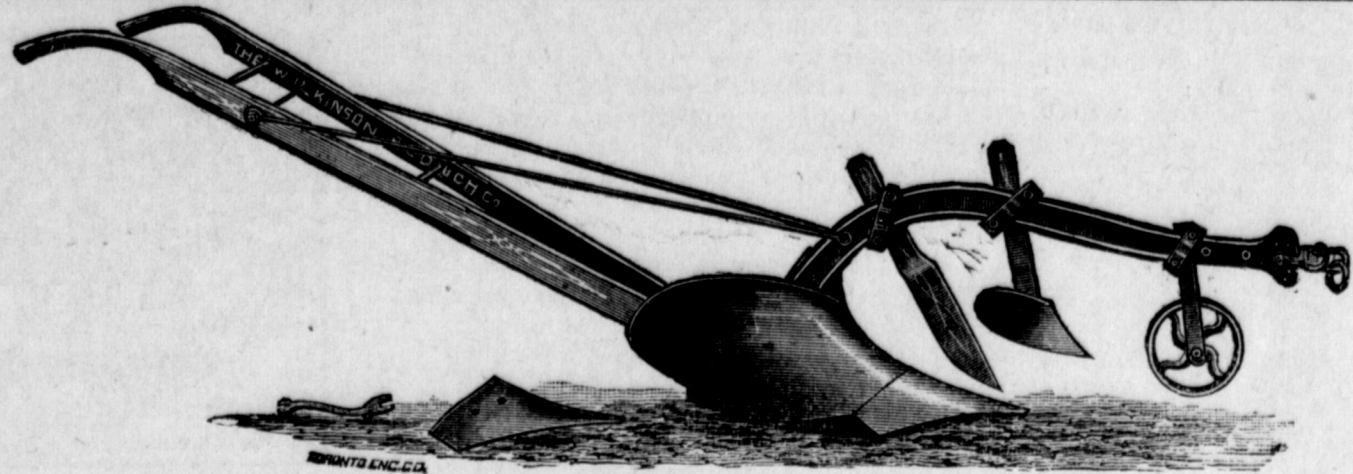
