Swiss Watchmaking

It is most interesting to compare the different methods by means of which the highest grade of mechanical perfection is attained in different countries, says a writer in Cassier's Magazine. Notwithstanding the high character of American watches for example, the finest Swiss watches still maintain their great reputation. The Swiss workman receives the parts in the rough form from the manufacturer, takes them to his home, puts his best individual skill into the finishing and assembling, and returns the finished watch to his employer. The latter inspects the work, and out of a batch of say fifty watches he selects five or six as worthy of his attention and puts the others into the regular trade under some general trade name. The selected watches he readjusts, working over them for days, and perhaps months, before he considers them worthy to bear his own name, and it is these watches which go to those who not only have the money to buy but also the patience to wait.

A prominent firm of American jewelers, chafing under the inconvenience of this Old World method of doing things, sought to introduce American methods and see if the highest grade of Swiss watches could not be built more methodically. A factory was built, enticing rates of wages were offered to the most skilful workmen, and the experiment was tried. But alas! the Swiss workmen soon decided that no regular wages could pay him for the loss of his liberty. To be on hand when the whistle blew in the morning, to have his stated hour for dinner, and his fixed hour for quitting at night—these restrictions he could not stand. Formerly he had worked when he felt like it and stopped when it pleased him, and when he was paid for one job he took his own time to begin the next, generally waiting until his funds run low. The factory plan did not run long, and the idle building now bears silent testimony to the Swiss love for independence which is as much a factor in their present life as past history.

Typewriter For The Blind. Various inventors have striven to alleviate the conditions of this class of unfortunates, and several instruments or attachments have been devised which are more or less successful, and have been noted in these columns. The latest machine of this kind is the product of an English inventor, and seems to be a step in advance of previous efforts in this line. This machine is to the blind what the typewriter is to other persons. It has the advantage, however, of being more simple. It prints the characters in the usual embossed form. Eight keys are used in combination, these making all the letters of the alphabet and all the figures, and any person familiar with the system can read what may be written. The machine is made to be worked with one hand, so that the writer may read or "take notes" with the other from a book. In this way he makes note of his studies, or he may transcribe to others readily. If both hands were employed on the machine, a blind person would have an awkward time in finding his place in the book he was using each time he had written whatever number of words he might have been carrying in his mind. 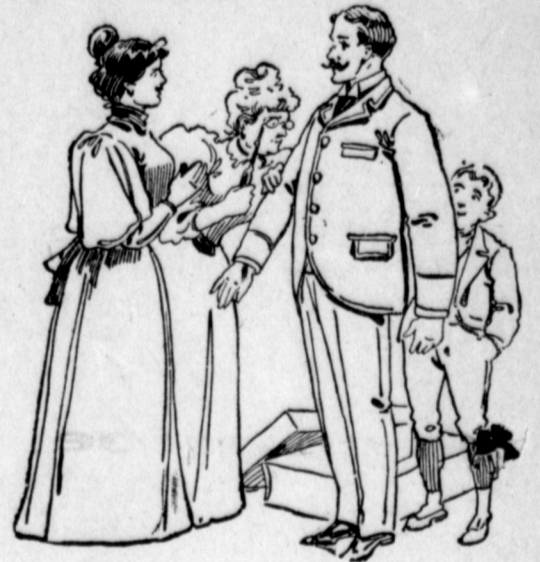
