Newfoundland's Discovery.

Rarely has any colonial governor been in a position to use such optimistic language as Sir Herbert Murray did recently when addressing the Newfoundland Legislature. Perhaps, however, it was a little indiscreet to suggest the question as to whether this now flourishing colony could have been in such a desperate condition as was made to appear when the Mother Country was besought not long ago to give her aid. No doubt, there was some degree of commercial paralysis at that time, and equally without doubt, British help was most effective in setting the machinery of trade again in motion. But the transformation scene disclosed by the governor is so sudden and sweeping as to afford support to the view that the tension was never nearly so great as was represented. Be that as it may, however, it is gratifying to learn that Newfoundland now stands on thoroughly robust legs. Credit is restored; there is no longer any danger of the interest on the public debt being unpaid; a substantial surplus has replaced a serious deficit; fishing prospects are most promising; railway extension is being steadily pushed on; and—perhaps the best news of all—the young mining industry is growing apace. Precious metals are not yet discovered, but coal and iron of excellent quality abound. Taking advantage of the prosperous condition of the finances the government proposes to free from duty some imports which are at present severely taxed. Whether it would not be wiser to retain some of these sources of revenue until the railways in hand are completed seems open to question. We all know the extreme difficulty of re-imposing any indirect taxation which has once been remitted; in the event, therefore, of another crisis occurring in Newfoundland, the government might have nothing for it but to suspend reproductive works of all sorts, thereby retarding the development of the mineral riches of the colony. We hope that Newfoundland is not again depending upon outside help as a safeguard against disaster.

THE EOPHONE.

By Which the Direction of Sound May be Accurately Determined.

Possibly there is no greater terror among the many met with at sea than a fog. The helplessness of our harbor boats and the clamor of bells and whistles during a heavy fog in New York harbor give one some idea of this nightmare of the ocean, but when a fog closes down upon a vessel at sea the most reckless captain proceeds cautiously and anxiously.

The probability of collisions and wrecks due to fogs has been accepted as a sort of unavoidable evil, which must become greater as the number and speed of vessels increase. But the inventive genius of man could not let such a condition of affairs continue without attempting to do away with it, and there has been perfected a simple instrument, called the eophone, by which the direction from which a sound proceeds may be determined with absolute accuracy in fog or darkness.

The simplest description of the instrument is that it consists of two bell mouthed sound receivers, separated by a central diaphragm. The sound receivers are connected to the two ears, and, when pointed directly at a source of sound, the noise is the same in each ear. When turned away, the sound is heard in only one ear.

On shipboard the sound catching and dividing part of the instrument extends above the top of the chart-house. The tubes are brought within the chart-house, and the instrument may be turned from below to point in any desired direction.

The eophone has not been perfected, there being many points for which numerous experiments, lasting over several years, have been required, in order to determine the best form, especially with the sounding tubes and ear pieces. Various refinements, such as microphones and devices adding to the complication, but not improving the use, have been eliminated.—New York Herald.

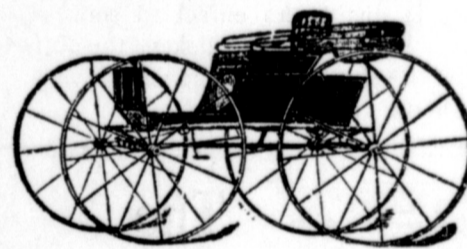
