The New Governor.

It is now definitely settled that Senator McClelan will be the new governor of New Brunswick. He has resigned his seat in the chamber, and will enter on the duties of his new office immediately.

Mr. McClelan was born at Hopewell, Albert county, in 1831, and is therefore 65 years old. He was educated at Mount Allison college and has served as governor of that institution for a number of years. He first entered political life in 1854 at the age of twenty-three years as a member of his native county in the house of assembly, and sat in that body continuously until confederation in 1871, when he was called to the senate of which he has ever since been a respected and conspicuous member. He was a member of the executive council of New Brunswick and chief commissioner of the board of works from 1866 until elevated to the senate the following year. Senator McClelan broke from the Macdonald Government at the time of the Pacific scandal and since then has been a pronounced liberal. He is a gentleman of excellent ability, and eminent for his high personal character. He lives in a beautiful home at Riverside, Albert, his residence a new one, being one of the finest in the eastern section of the province. He is in easy financial circumstances, and the salary of the governorship is not the first consideration in his case.

Drink Water Plentifully.

The general tendency of people is not to drink water enough. Pure water itself never can be unwholesome, unless it is taken at too low a temperature, when food is eaten. The reason for this is that digestion stops until the cold water in the system is brought up to the proper temperature. In the Chataquan the following advice is given:

We have proof that an insufficient quantity of drinking water is a frequent source of disease. George Henry Fox, M. D., professor of diseases of the skin in the New York College of Physicians and Surgeons, says in a recent article on this subject: "It is quite certain that few people drink too much water, and I feel sure that many unpleasant feelings and symptoms of actual disease would quickly disappear if the sufferers only appreciated the value of this best and cheapest of all remedies (pure water)." Dr. Charles L. Dana, professor of nervous diseases in the New York post-graduate medical school, in an article on diet in nervous diseases, says: "Water should be drunk between meals or before meals, and a moderate amount at meals. At least three pints, or about six tumblerfuls, should be taken daily. American neurotics do not drink water enough. They have half dessicated nerves, and dessicated nerves increases nervous irritability."

Oranges From Jaffa.

England is taking oranges and lemons from Jaffa on the coast of Syria, and in Chambers' Journal some of the advantages of the country as an orange producer are explained:

The risks which the Jaffa orange grower runs, as compared with those which the grower in Florida has to face, are infinitesimal. The storms that visit the Syrian coast, although of frequent occurrence during the winter months, are not of such force as to damage the trees; in fact, it is remarkable how very small is the proportion of ripe fruit even which falls to the ground after a storm. This is no doubt due to the fact that the Jaffa orange tree is not allowed to grow larger than a good sized shrub; and as the trees are placed only four yards apart, they afford each other very considerable protection from the force of the wind. The cactus shrubs, also, forming the hedge of the garden, grow very thick and high, and give additional protection from the storms. Blizzards and frosts, which have proved so ruinous in Florida, are quite unknown in Jaffa.

POISONED HIMSELF.

Then sat Down and wrote as Long as he Could, Describing the Feelings at Different Stages.

CHICAGO, Nov. 30.—After destroying all marks on his clothing which could in any way lead to his identification, a well-dressed man about 30 years of age committed suicide at the Kimbal Hotel, 262 Clark-street, last night by taking laudanum. He described the effects of the drug in writing until his hand could no longer hold the pencil. The body was not found until late this afternoon, death having resulted some time previous. In his efforts to destroy all clues which might lead to his identification the suicide forgot two articles which indicate that he was an Easterner. A small mirror found in the hand of the dead man bears the stamp of a firm in Rochester N. Y., and the memorandum book in which he described the manner of his death contains the trade mark of A. W. McCloy & Company, 443 Wood-street, Pittsburg, Pa. The trade marks on the clothing, even to his hat and shoes, were effaced. He engaged a room at the hotel last evening, and registered as E. L. Bryan, although the police are of the opinion that this is not his name. When found the body was lying diagonally across the bed and the memorandum book and pencil were near by, having evidently fallen from his hand.

Before the taking of the drug he wrote a letter to the hotel proprietor and another to the press, in which he gave no cause for his act other than that his life had been terminated in failure. In both these letters he made some humorous remarks. He continued his description of the effects of the drug until all his strength had failed him, and some of the last of it could not be deciphered. As much of it as could be made out is as follows:

"To M. D.—: Drank one ounce of laudanum. After five minutes feel little or no pain. Heart action now pronounced. A slight pain in stomach.

"(Note). My stomach is very weak, having suffered for years from acute dyspepsia.

"Ten minutes. Condition about the same. Pulse rapid and pains in wrists and slight pain in region of heart. Hand trembles. A feeling of dullness with more pain in all parts of the body.

"(Note). Will keep up this description of effects as long as possible. Hope it will be of use to medical science. Eyes show change. A feeling of drowsiness coming on. Sort of a feeling of intoxication accompanied by slight fever.

"Twenty minutes—Pain increasing. A slight perspiration started. Am getting sleepy. Have a sort of numb feeling and no pain.

The last few sentences were scarcely legible, so unsteady had the writer's hand become, and although he attempted to write a few more lines it could not be made out.

The clothing of the suicide is of good material and the police think that he may be well connected. No money was found. He was five feet nine inches tall, and weighs about 150 pounds. He was smooth shaven, and had brown hair and blue eyes.
