### A Refreshing Summer Drink.

Having found a drink for summer days that seems to meet all wants and tastes—healthful, easily made and inexpensive, we give the rule in the very words it was given us by a thrifty New England housekeeper; and to aid in fixing it in the memory, without pencil, she said: "It is just two threes and three twos." So given, it is easily remembered. The two threes were three gallons of cold water, and three pounds of granulated sugar, put into a large stone jar together. The three twos were two large spoonfuls of tartaric acid, two large spoonfuls of ground ginger and two large spoonfuls of essence of wintergreen. Mix these last three ingredients well together, make into a paste with a little water and stir into the "two threes," adding one cake of compressed yeast, or a scanty cup of the home-made article. Stir well. Cover and allow to stand for twenty-four hours. Then bottle and fasten down with corks. Keep in a cool place. It is good in twenty-four hours, it is better in forty eight, is perfect in ten days. It is exceedingly refreshing in its effects, and to invalids and dyspeptics its tonic properties usually prove it just the thing for the stomach.—Katherine Armstrong, in Detroit Free Press.

### Food For Reflection.

Referring to the nail trust or pool covering the United States and Canada, the Monetary Times (Toronto) remarks that when the discovery of its existence was made, the usual protestations of the perfect harmlessness of the combination were offered in defense. However satisfactory the arrangements may be to the operators, consumers are beginning to complain that while the makers were charging \$2.55 for wire nails, and \$2.30 per keg for cut nails, they were selling in Europe for \$1 less than in the United States. One result of this discrimination was that nails were purchased for exportation, shipped across the Atlantic and then shipped back again, and after paying 40 cents, 20 cents each way, in freights across the Atlantic and back, they were sold below the price charged by the pool to domestic consumers. The nails in question escaped the payment of the American duty, on account of their American origin, the packages not having been broken on the other side of the Atlantic. The total cost of the returned nails, including all charges, was \$1.90 per keg, at the outside, while nails sold by the pool for domestic use, then cost \$2.45 now, thanks to an increased duty of 15 per cent per keg, since put on by congress, the price is \$2.55 at Pittsburgh. The pool has taken steps to prevent a repetition of this operation by cutting off the supply. The profits of the largest firm in the pool was 27 1/2 per cent in 1895; now its profits reach 30 per cent. on a capital of \$4,000,000. How much water is there in this \$4,000,000 of capital? We have no report of what the Canadian partners have done or are doing.—Chicago Review.

### A St. Louis Boy's Dive.

ST. LOUIS, June 30.—Albert J. Baker, aged nineteen, who lives with his uncle, J. W. Ginder, in this city, today made the first dive into the Mississippi River ever taken from the Eads bridge. He is a pupil of Prof. Bill Clark, who has turned out many good divers. For weeks young Baker has been fired with an ambition to jump off the bridge, and has been practicing almost daily at the natatorium. He was particularly anxious to jump head first, and not feet first, as all the jumpers before him had done. This he did this morning, and he did it well and successfully, making the first bona fide dive ever made from the Eads bridge.

The distance from the top of the bridge to the water is 125 feet. Baker struck the water head first and soon came up. He swam about 250 feet to a waiting tug, and was taken on board without having been hurt.

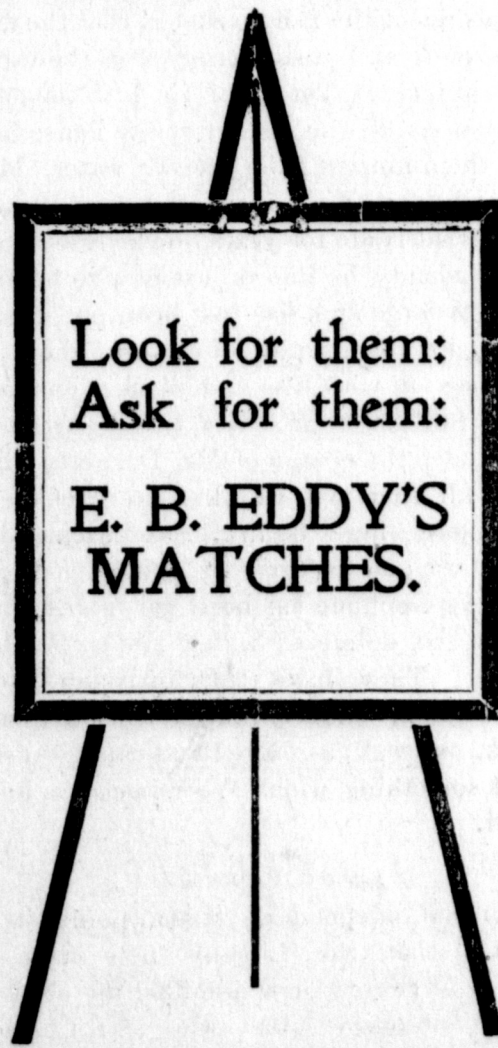
