A RECENT legislature of Maine offered \$1 bounty for every seal killed in Maine waters. This was done in the interest of the salmon fishermen, for the seal is very destructive to the fish. Fishermen say the seal is their greatest enemy and destroys more salmon than are caught. Mr. James M. Treat of Stockton Springs is a salmon fisherman who has given the question much thought, and was active in having the seal law passed. He says the State last year paid a bounty on the destruction of 1,700 seals. He says he notices a vast improvement in the salmon fishery, seals are scarcer and consequently less troublesome. Capt. Bramhall, who keeps a fish market in Belfast, corroborates Mr. Treat and says he finds less bitten fish than formerly. The captain believes in the law and says it is a great help to the salmon fishermen and consequently to the public.—Leader Fort Fairfield.
