A HEAVY fall of hail struck town and the surrounding country the day before election. From twelve o'clock noon to half past twelve ice fell in lumps and blocks, accompanied by a flood of rain. THE SUMMER time table of the C. P. R. came into effect on Monday. The only passenger train North leaves at 11.38 standard. Trains arrive from St. John at that hour, and also at 10.30 at night. In going to St. John a train leaves at 6 in the morning and 4.28 in the afternoon. The Gibson comes at 12.30 and goes at 1.15. By leaving on the 11.40 train the trip may be made to Edmundston in a day.

LUMBER.—A lumberman informs THE DISPATCH that there are about six and a half million feet of lumber held up on the Tobique it being the property of Estey, Upham, and Beyeridge. The Aroostook lumber is about all out. On the Upper St. John there is something like 15,000,000 feet that will not see the river this year. On Saturday Moore's corporation drive was at Monquart. Pond's upper drive was below Edmundston.

THE SCHOOL at McAdam Junction, of which Henry Harvey Stuart of Fredericton, is principal and Miss Susie C. Pass of Harvey, York Co., is the primary teacher, was visited on the 16th inst., by Judge Stevens of the Charlotte County Court, and Hon. A. G. Blair. Judge Stevens expressed himself highly satisfied with the conduct of the school and efficiency of the teachers. Likewise, the Attorney General also expressed himself very much pleased with what he saw.

He lately got a pair of cattle from William Hand, Richmond, that had a live weight of 3300 lbs and when killed and dressed weighed 1800 lbs. He shipped one hind quarter to the Junction House at McAdam and another to St. Stephen. There have been heard complaints that a good piece of beef couldn't be got in town, but a man could not repeat such a thing if he would look into Mr. Cole's store.

J. H. WILBUR and CHIC STEPHENSON have taken the stables adjoining the Wilbur House and have given them a thorough overhauling. They will do a general livery business and are already in a position to turn out a half dozen first class rigs. Their most attractive double seated carriage is an English Surrey with canopy top made by Grant, Birmingham & Co. of Woodstock. They have a new Bangor buggy and a light road wagon by the same firm, and a road wagon from the factory of Chestnut & Hipwell.

The timbers in the structure are heavy solidly placed. There is all told about 140,000 feet of lumber used. There are 64 windows containing 925 square feet of glass. The manufacturing department will be on the second floor, on the first floor will be the offices, the cutters room, store rooms and show rooms.
