PREFERENTIAL TRADE.

A good deal of interest is taken in the outcome of the preferential clauses of the new tariff, whereby English goods will be allowed into our markets at rates lower than other countries. The only hitch appears to be over the question whether or no, under the most favoured nation treaties, Belgium and Germany, have the same rights as England.

In a speech on the tariff made last week in parliament, Mr. Fielding said:—"In the enacting clause in relation to the reciprocal tariff, section 16, it will be found that one or two words which are mere surplusage and are repeated, have been omitted. But we also introduced into that section a sub section, in accordance with an intimation given at an earlier stage of the discussion as to doubt that existed in relation to the effect of the foreign treaties. We still maintain that those treaties do not apply to Canada, and that our course is entirely consistent with any obligations we might owe as part of the empire. Nevertheless there being a doubt in the matter, not so much in our own minds perhaps, but we go so far as to say that the thing is not certain. In view of all the discussion that has taken place we think it is well to provide that if it shall appear ultimately that these treaties are held to apply to Canada we have made provision therefor. We provide by sub-section "B" of section 16 as follows: "That the governor in Council may extend the benefits of such reciprocal tariff to any country which may be entitled thereto by virtue of any treaty with Her Majesty." We do not anticipate that we shall have any occasion to act under the clause, but in view of any possible doubt in the matter, it seems wise that we should provide for the possibility by putting in the clause. If we should find that the question takes such a shape that the treaties with Germany or Belgium, or any other foreign treaties may apply, undoubtedly it would open the question in a new form and might necessitate our reconsidering the whole subject.

Grand Orange Lodge.

The 68th annual meeting of the Grand Orange Lodge of British North America was held recently in Windsor, Ont. Sovereign Grand Master N. Clarke Wallace opened the meeting with his annual address. He referred to the Manitoba school question, alluded to the presence in this country of the Papal delegate and expressed the hope that he would be taught while here that the people of this country would tolerate no interference on the part of foreign powers in the management of her affairs. The report of the grand secretary, Robert Birmingham, showed that ten new primary lodge warrants had been issued during the year and one new county lodge warrant. The provincial lodge returns showed that 3,618 new members of the order had been initiated; 1,153 had joined by certificate; 2,418 had been suspended; 166 had been expelled, and 396 died. The report of the grand treasurer showed receipts, \$5,810.41; disbursements, \$2,096.23; balance, \$3,714.18. The report of the benefit fund showed receipts \$38,863.72 and expenditure \$37,723.76; leaving a balance of \$1,139.96.

The Grand Black Chapter of the L. O. A. elected officers as follows: A. J. Armstrong, St. John, G. M.; Lt.-Col. Scott, Kincairdine, Ont., D. G. M.; J. C. Gass, Shubenaadie, N. S., A. D. G. M.; Rev. William Walsh, chaplain; S. S. Williams, Toronto, registrar; J. W. Wilson, Toronto, treasurer; James Kelly, St. John, grand marshal; R. A. C. Brown, St. John, grand committee; R. G. Magee, St. John, D. G. lecturer.

Coming Changes.

The local government was recently in session in Fredericton. A number of cabinet changes are reported as imminent. The resignation of the Premier and Attorney General, Hon. Mr. Labillois' promotion to the post of Minister of Agriculture is also expected.—St. John Globe.

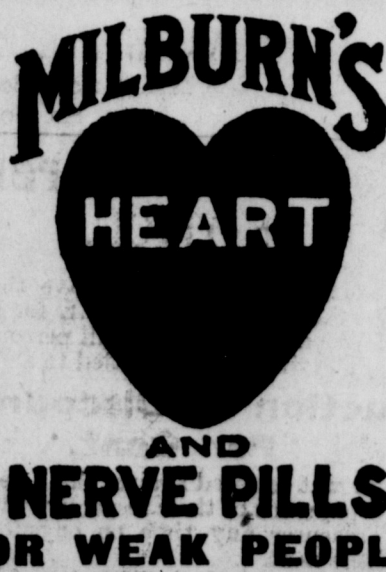

A New Opener.

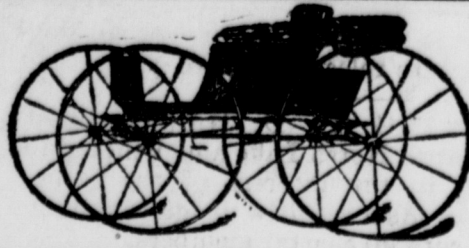

The First Railroad in America.

Gridley Bryant, a civil engineer, in 1826, projected the first railroad in the United States. It was built for the purpose of carrying granite from the quarries of Quincy, Massachusetts, to the nearest tidewater. Its length was 4 miles, including branches, and its first cost \$50,000. The sleepers were of stone and were laid across the track eight feet apart. Upon rails of wood, six inches thick, wrought-iron plater, three inches wide and a quarter of an inch thick, were spiked. At the crossings stone rails became unserviceable they were replaced by others of stone. —May Landies' Home Journal.
