Encourage the Home Industry. We understand a determined effort is being made by outside manufacturers of canned goods to crowd the goods put up by the Maritime Pure Food Co., at Woodstock, N. B. out of the market. Our consumers should not allow this but should always ask their dealers for the home production and give a good industry a chance for its life. Dealers also should be patriotic enough to give this company a chance to show what it can do. The success or failure of this enterprise means a good deal to the Maritime Provinces and if we can keep a considerable proportion of the large sum of money annually paid for canned goods among our own farmers it is just so much gained to the general business of the country, as the farmers will put it into circulation again among the dealers, whereas, if the money goes to Ontario our dealers will not very soon if ever see it again.—Co-operative Farmer.

E. H. McALPINE, of St. John, represented the department of justice in a case against the Woodstock Electric Light company, of which Allison B. Connell is president and secretary and Henry B. Connell managing director. The information against the company was in the name of Wm. Dibblee, police magistrate and collector of inland revenue, and the defendant was charged with neglect of duty in not having obtained from the department of inland revenue a certificate of registration for the year beginning the first of July, 1897, as required by section 35 of the act respecting the incorporation of electric light. The case was brought before J. R. Murphy and Chas. McLean, two justices of the peace. A. B. Connell appeared on behalf of the defendants, and immediately took the objection that a corporation cannot be proceeded against under the summary convictions act. Mr. McAlpine quoted the act relating to electric lights as giving authority to two justices of the peace to deal summarily with the offence. The justices decided to proceed and imposed a fine of \$50 on the defendants. The defendants will appeal from the magistrates' decision.

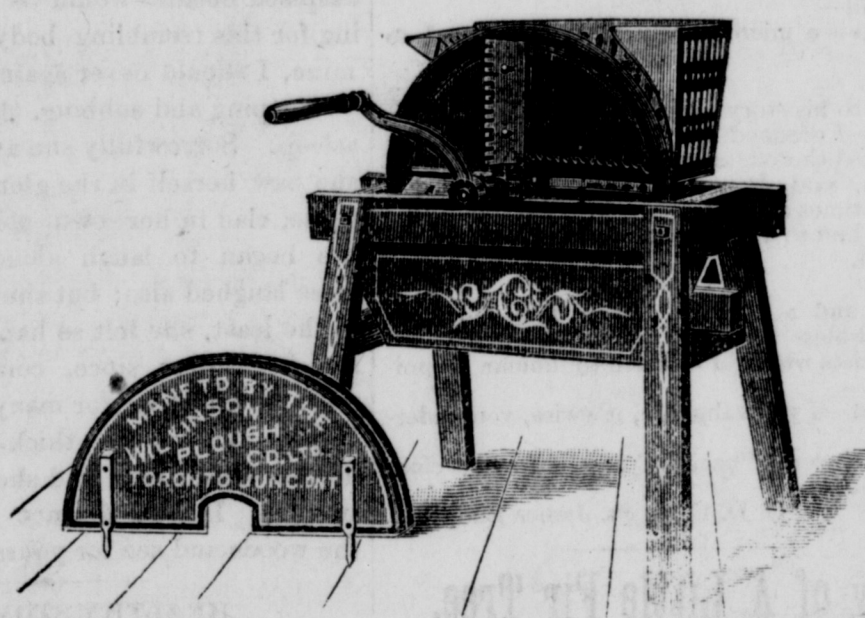
