The citizens were given to understand that while very little in the way of new sidewalks could be attempted this year, the council of 1898 would make it a point to start in with asphalting Main street sidewalks. What is the meaning then of the council's present action?

No town of any pretension puts down plank sidewalks in the business sections, and why will Woodstosk persist in sticking to 17th century ideas?

The job of asphalting Main street is now put back for ten years, for it would be better to continue the planking, than to have half and half. THE DISPATCH entirely mistakes public feeling in the matter, if the citizens generally do not condemn this late departure of the council.

1t would have been far better to nave torn up the old sidewalks and filled in with gravel preparatory to laying asphalt next year. But we have taken a backward instead of a forward step.

The present council has its virtues, and if it pulls us out of the financial hole, at the end of the year, much will be forgiven it. We fear, however, that the progressive element is altogether absent, and while cautious men are needd, men of progress are also wanted.

By the way, is not the new sidewalk too high, and is it not the case that in many places of the town, the same is true?

We agree that there are difficulties to be met in laying a proper asphalt sidewalk on Main street, but the way to overcome these difficulties does not lie in running away from

The Nova Scotia Exhibition and Industria Fair, held under authority of the Provincial Legislature and the city of Halifax, will be opened at Halifax on September 28, and will continue till Friday night, October 1st.

The largest prize list, oy many thousands of dollars, ever offered in the Maritime Prov inces, is open for competition by our Agriculturalists, Manufacturers, Fishermen and others.

The Exhibition is to be held in the handsome new buildings now erected on one of the most desirable sites in the city of Halifax. These buildings will cost in the vicinity of \$55,000.00 and will be the finest structures of the kind in Eastern Canada.

A half mile track for speeding competition is row being constructed, under an expert, and the finest track in the Maritime Provinces is promised.

Great Preparations Are Already Under Way.

Special arrangements are this year being made by the St. John Exhibition with the Railways and Steamers. The Canadian Pacific will carry all exhibits from N. B. points to St. John at the regular rates and if the exhibits are returned to starting point the property of the exhibition, the freight charges will be refunded, thus making the carriage of exhibits practically free.

There will be several excursions during the Exhibition over the C. P. P. on which very special low rates will be given.

Recognizing the growing importance of the poultry industry the St. John Exhibition is this year making the most up-to-date arrangements for this department. A new commodious well lighted and warm building will be provided and \$800 in prizes are offered in competition. Prizes will be given on single birds instead of in pairs and an expert judge will be engaged.


