Perishable Goods.

The Ontario government has received word that the shipment of perishable fruits sent to England from Canada according to the plan formulted by the late Edward Jack, of Fredericton, N. B., arrived in splendid condition, proving the soundness of his theory. The story is as follows: The official report of the department of agriculture for 1893, contained a paper by Mr. Jack, who was an enthusiast on the matter of peat moss as a substitute for cold storage. He told of results in Ger. many, where fish packed in peat moss for over two weeks, retained their freshness, and delicate and perishable fruits retained all their qualities. This shows the immense utility of peat moss. Its tremendous absorbent qualities render it a a great antidote to atmospheric yeasts and bacterian, which bring about decay. The supply throughout the province is estimated as sufficient to last ten thousand years, even though very widely used, and if results continued to be good, the shipment of Canadian perishable fish, fruit and other goods will be put on a safe

It will not be long until the county couucil meets, and among its first duties will be the election of a warden. Probably there will be many candidates for this honorable position. It is said that our town members-any of them-will not refuse the office if it is thrown at them, and it is not altogether impossible that a little quiet canvassing may be going on. However, it is doubtful if the wardenship will come to town. The county council is essentially a county body, and the town is a separate municipality from the county. The town has its own government, apart from the county, and its own honorsthe office of mayor, for instance-to confer on its worthy citizens. The county council is primarily the legislative body of the county-of the parishes. The parishes will likely want the warden to be of the county, on the principle that a town representative is more or less of an anomaly at the board, a sort of fish out of water.
