CARLETON CO. AND KLONDYKE.

The producers in this county, and the producers in Klondyke are both suffering from an overproduction of raw material, which they cannot at present, market.

We have wealth in Carleton County which we cannot profitably exchange for other wealth, and the miners of Klondyke have wealth which they cannot exchange for a certain kind of wealth that they need.

Now, if for about a week Carleton County could be annexed to Klondyke or vice-versa what a harvest there would be for both communities. We have food, more than we can use, we want gold; Klondyke has gold, more than it can use and wants food. Why cannot the politicians so adjust matters that we can exchange, the one for the other. What is the use of politicians if they cannot overcome these trifling hindrances of nature?

Capt. Constantine of the N. W. Mounted Police, now in the Klondyke recently issued a notice warning the Dawson miners, un-supplied with provisions to go to Fort Yukon. He said:—"It is absolutely hazardous to build hopes upon the arrival of other boats. It is almost beyond a possibility that any more food will come into this district. For those who have not laid in a winter's supply to remain here any longer is to court death from starvation, or, at least a certainty of sickness from scurvy or other troubles. Starvation now stares every man in the face who is hoping and waiting for outside relief."

Late arrivals from Dawson City have stated that "while there is plenty of gold, whiskey and music, there is a decided shortage of food."

A steambot named the Weare, on the way to Dawson city, was forcibly stopped at Circle City, some way down the river, and a demand for provisions was made. An authorized account says:—"The chairman of the (mining) committee said the miners were prepared to pay any price the company might exact. He said the goods should be placed in the hands of the company's agent, and the committee would guarantee payment.

The demand met with a direct refusal. The leader made a peculiar signal, and immediately 50 men armed with rifles and shot-guns, arranged themselves on a bluff, commanding the boat. Mr. Weare, the commander, was told that if he attempted to put a man in the pilot house the man would be compelled to leave the wheel. Mr. Weare declined further conference, and the miners began unloading and checking out the cargo. This brought Mr. Weare to a realization of the fact that the miners were determined, and, after several conferences, during which the men offered advantageous terms for the settlement of the trouble, and were rebuffed, the work of unloading proceeded. There were several clashes in the afternoon between miners and peace officials, but no direct offence was offered. Mr. Weare capitulated at 5 o'clock, and agreed to treat with the miners in the morning. An armed guard was left aboard the boat, and the residents of the city returned to the beach. Mr. Weare agreed in the morning to allow everything that had been taken ashore to remain and to land enough more to supply the immediate wants of the camp. He also agreed to give a rebate on all provisions it would be necessary to freight from Fort Yukon to complete the winter's supply."

"The steamer Bella, which came up the river a few days after the Weare, fared no better. It had no orders to leave supplies here, but she was held up by determined miners, and 50 tons of food were brought ashore and placed in the Alaska Commercial Company's store, to be sold at the usual prices to those in need of food. Guards were placed on the boat to see that nothing was stolen. Capt. Dixon, one of the most popular men on the river, could not stop the miners.

"When I saw they were simply hungry men who insisted on being fed," he said to me, "I could do nothing. They were reasonable, and took off only enough to keep them alive. What they took from the Weare and from the Bella will barely feed them for eight months. I suppose, too, they will have to feed the hungry men passing through during the winter."

These men in Circle City had any amount of money. As will be noticed they promised to pay any price for food. In fact, money was no consideration, but they only got the food by force. It would certainly appear as if the force was justifiable, for nature teaches that men will not starve when food can be procured.

It is hard to make some people believe that money is not wealth, in the true meaning of the word, but this Klondyke object lesson should set them about right.

Taking it all in all the condition of the Carleton County farmers is at least as good as that of the Klondyke miners. They have a surplus of food while gold is scarce. The Klondykers have a surplus of gold, and food is not to be bought for money.

If the politicians cannot manage to annex Carleton County, to Klondyke, just for the brief period of an exchange of food for gold, which would be highly satisfactory to both parties interested, there is nothing left but to compare cases.

Perhaps by next summer the gold of Klondyke may reach Carleton County, and a surplus of the Carleton County buckwheat go up the Yukon.

There is one thing about the situation which counts for the C. C. farmer.

If he has the food and not the gold, he can, at least, eat, and wait. If the Klondyke miner has the gold and not the food, he can't eat, and he can't wait. He must get right off the stage.
