WIDE TIRES:-The Royal Gazette for a month past has contained a notice of interest to farmers. It is to the effect that on and after the first day of May, 1899 the wheels of every vehicle loaded with stone, gravel, sand, or other material of any kind of nature whatsoever, when the load exceeds in weight one and a half tons, shall, when used and passing over or along any Highway, be provided with tires not less than four inches wide; the owner or person in charge of any such vehicle shall, for every offence against this Section, incur a penalty of five dollars."


