This, if not particularly valuable as a solace, makes at least interesting reading:

Walking through the gallery of statuary at the Luxembourg I saw the white carved nude figure of a man—a man in all the splendid strength of youth. Standing behind him on a higher part of the pedestal was the form of a woman; and this woman was leaning over, her face turned toward him, her lips about to be pressed upon his. I moved closer and to one side, and saw that on the face of the youth was an expression of deathly agony; and then I noted that every muscle of that splendid body was tense with awful pain. And in that one glance I saw that the woman's body was the body of a tigress—that only her face was beautiful—and that the arms ended in claws that were digging deep into the vitals of the man as she drew his face to hers.

Suddenly feeling the need of fresh air I turned and went out on the street. That piece of statuary gave Philip Burne-Jones the suggestion for his painting, "The Vampire." Now one might suppose from that awful sermon in stone that woman was the cause of man's undoing. But for the benefit of henpecked and misunderstood husbands I'll call attention to the fact that the men who have achieved most in literature, music and philosophy are men who knew from sad experience the sharpness of woman's claws; Socrates, Dante, Shakespeare, Rousseau, Milton, Wagner, Paganini, and so many more that were I to name them all the world would not be large enough to contain the books in which they are printed. When I wrote a line or two last week on single tax, as the prominent doctrine of Henry George, I did not suppose that his death would have occurred before another issue. Henry George is dead, but Henry Georgeism is not dead. I can recollect when Henry George first came into prominence. He was regarded by many people as a dangerous man, as one who desired to upset all government, to set masses against classes, as a fire brand of the most ferocious type. So are all reformers judged, by the prejudiced, the greatest of all reformers not excepted. In noting the newspaper comments on Henry George's death, I am struck by the genuine sense of sorrow that seems even to impress the writers. The cry is "a great and good man is gone." George dies and Tammany lives and wins. Is not this true to life? With all his peculiarities George lived and worked for the bettering of humanity. Tammany is the element of selfishness, as Georgeism is the element of altruism. But the good will overcome the evil in time, and many of Henry George's doctrines will have been put in practice, and his name will be honored, when Tammany is only remembered, as everything else that is associated with base corruption, is remembered. At the funeral of the great thinker, one speaker testified very strongly to the personal religion of Henry George. He said that one time the power of religion in social problems was questioned by a man who was talking to Henry George. With flashing eye, George replied: "If religion be nothing more than you think it to be, our cause is lost, because, unless there is reality in religion and we can appeal through it to humanity, we shall never get back God's land for God's poor children." Father McGlynn was a warm friend of George. Says an exchange: No wonder the people assembled at Henry George's funeral could not be restrained from bursting into applause at Fr. McGlynn's funeral oration. Even in reading it in cold type it plays strongly upon one's emotions. It was a wonderfully eloquent address abounding in the deepest pathos and in beautiful imagery. Here is a sample extract from it: It were a pity if that man should have been elected mayor of New York. It is well, that he was spared the ignoble strife and the daily carking cares of such an office. I repeat, no office was worthy of his generous nature, his great sympathy and his noble aims. He died just as he should have died, just as he ought to have died. It is a great and good thing to be a preacher. It is a great and a better thing to be an apostle. It is the greatest and the best thing to add to the character of an apostle that of a crusader. It adds to the great story of being a preacher, an apostle and a crusader to have died for his faith.

Our board of school trustees has increased the teachers working day from five to five and a half hours. I cheerfully admit that our teachers have been receiving too large salaries, that some of them have amassed princely and princely fortunes, have become arrogant and bloated bond holders and that it is quite time we sat on them. But I would suggest, with my usual modesty and diffidence, that we cut salaries rather than extend hours. We already confine the scholars long enough to get from them the maximum amount of intellectual labor of which they are capable. In our laudable desire to increase the hardships of the teachers let us not injure the innocent scholars. Let us firmly reduce the teachers salaries to about \$100 a year and put a special tax on them. Then shall we have them under our thumb to our heart's desire.

Whether the town council was morally justified in refusing to grant a sum of money to the sufferers in the Windsor fire, may be debated to the end of time. But as for the legal objections, why not settle them? Let the town council find out, once and for all what actions they can do legally, and what actions are illegal, so that when a grant is proposed for such and such a purpose they will know just what their powers are. Surely the council should know what their rights are and whether or no they can vote money. Is there no way in which they can find this out?
