Sudden Death.

Mr. Thomas McIntyre one of the principle residents of Richmond parish, and a farmer well and generally known throughout the county, died very suddenly last Wednesday evening. He was spending the evening with his family, and some friends who were visiting them at his home. He seemed in excellent spirits and was laughing at some remark made by one of the company, when he was attacked. His wife first noticed that there was something wrong with him. She laid him on the sofa on which he had been sitting, and sent one of the boys for Mr. Andrew McIntyre who lives close by. When this gentleman, a brother of deceased, arrived on the scene, which was not more than ten minutes after the attack, life had fled. Mr. McIntyre had been apparently in the best of health. In the afternoon he had driven his daughter to visit a neighbor Mrs. John Bull, and after returning home had helped his brother load some grain on a sled, and had attended to his evening work. There was nothing to indicate that death was especially near to him. When the news was made known in the town and county, it was scarcely credited, at first. Inquiry soon confirmed its sad truthfulness. Mr. McIntyre was a man widely respected and the large attendance at the funeral on Friday afternoon testified to the high esteem in which he was held. It is estimated that there were one hundred teams in the procession. The pallbearers were Andrew Ray, Alfred Ray, Andrew Currie and Thomas Campbell. The remains were taken to St. John's church, where the service of the English church was said, and were then interred in the adjoining graveyard, Rev. Mr. Teel officiating. Mrs. McIntyre who survives her husband, is a daughter of the late Abner Bull a sister of F. Byron Bull and of Mrs. C. H. L. Perkins of Woodstock. There are six children living. Of two sons, Woodbury lives at home and Perley is now in British Columbia. There are four daughters, Kathleen, Alice, Nora and Ruby, the eldest of whom teaches school at Pembroke. The utmost sympathy goes out from the community to Mrs. McIntyre and her family in their great sorrow.

A Pointer for Shareholders.

Shareholders as a rule place too much confidence and too much authority in Boards of Directors. The latter not only have sole control of the business which they are appointed to administer, but they have the selection of the auditors who certify to their honesty. The shareholders of every company ought at least to insist on the appointment of an auditor, who should carry on his investigation independently altogether of the directors. Had a safeguard of this kind been more generally adopted in the past there would be fewer and less serious failures to record among business and financial corporations—Toronto World.

Too Previous.

The Fredericton Reporter discussing the special tax that the city council is about putting on peddlars, says "Another question which has incidentally cropped to the front during the discussion is the reenactment of the commercial travellers' tax, but it is generally believed the Council will not adopt such a measure. Even Woodstock, which has tried it for several years, has repealed this by-law. It is generally felt, however, that if commercial men continue to do a sub rosa retail trade, as well as calling upon them dealers, there will be a disposition to frame a law that will impose a heavy tax on such. It was never intended that the law should give countenance to a retail peddling business." Woodstock has not repealed its commercial travellers license by law whatever may be its intention.

Scott Act in St. Stephen.

In his latest report to the St. Stephen town council, the magistrate commented as follows upon the enforcement of the act during the year:—The Scott Act inspectors for this town, ex-inspector McClure and the present inspector Campbell both had a hand in the business included in their time during the year, seemed to have performed the duty fairly well, for, while there were only about one half the saloons in operation that used to be, there was more money obtained from fines than in any previous year, with only five dollars paid out for counsel fees. There were thirty-eight convictions secured during the year, and thirty-five of them netted \$1800 besides the costs. Two convicted men paid their penalties by serving two months in goal and one who was convicted a few days ago left town.

Mayor Whitlock thought the showing very creditable. In no town where he had visited was the sale of liquor so restricted and the evidence of drunkenness less noticeable.

St. Stephen runs the Scott Act and gets the revenue. The county has nothing to do with it.

Enterprise Only Needed.

E. A. Charters of Sussex, an authority in mining speaking to a Sackville Post reporter, regarding New Brunswick as a mining centre said this province has a great future once the people realize that it will pay to invest their money. He declared it could point out fully half a dozen places in this province where gold could be secured in paying quantities if the properties were developed. This, he said, would necessitate an outlaying of about \$15,000 or \$20,000. Nobody here could be got to invest in them, but there were New Brunswickers who had put capital in mines in far away Rossland and were not getting as big returns as they would in this province. One lead he knew of would yield copper, gold and silver, each of paying quantities, and if it was in Rossland could easily be sold, undeveloped as it is, for \$100,000.

They Wouldn't Pay Here.

Moncton street cars have proved a decided failure financially. It was decided three weeks ago to close the road for the winter, but on subsequent consideration it was agreed to keep the cars running until snow fell, provided the motorman and other employees would run the road on their own responsibility, pay expenses and have the surplus for their wages. The surplus has been decidedly slim, so slim in fact that one employe said that if they realized enough to pay their board they will be satisfied. The first snow storm will close traffic.—Ex.
