U. S. CONSUL JAMES

Who Leaves Shortly for a New Post In Prescott, Ont.

Mr. Grenville James, whose portrait appears, received official notice of the confirmation of his appointment as U. S. Consul at Prescott, Ont., and expects to leave shortly for his new post. For the past four years Mr. James has most acceptably filled the important position of consul at this port, always proving himself obliging and accommodating to those who have business with him. His departure is a matter of regret,



and it is only hoped that his successor may make himself as well-liked. Mr. James was born in the city of Binghamton, N. Y., in 1869. The succeeding year his family moved to New York city where they have since resided. In 1885 he entered the journalistic field as a reporter on the staff of the New York Sun. Later, he worked for the World and Daily Continent, and was a free lance on several other papers. In 1892 Mr. James received the appointment as U. S. Consul at Yarmouth, N. S. He was afterwards transferred to Woodstock and now goes to Prescott Ont. Mr. James' family have been conspicuous in public affairs in the adjoining republic, his maternal grandfather, Gen. Worth, being a man of great ability and influence.

Early last autumn Mr. James married, in Toronto, Miss Florence Macdonell. It is understood that Mrs. James has relatives living in Prescott which will, naturally, make the change very acceptable for her.

SEWER EXTENSION.

The sewer extension from a point on Broadway near Mr. Merritt's house, to the intersection of St. Gertrude street, and down Prince William connecting with the river road present sewer, seems to be a justifiable expenditure by the council—in fact a work absolutely necessary. An immense supply of water formed on Broadway in the spring, enough almost to enable the residents to train for rowing matches, and the only possible means of disposal of it, is by sewer construction. The town will support the council in this expenditure.
