**A Lesson For Topers.**

From Fort Kent, Me. comes the following sad story, decidedly with a moral:—Dedime Daigle, who lives a short distance out of town on the St. Francis road, came into the village and proceeded to deliberately load on the white rum that is a popular beverage with some of the gentle Acadian peasants on the St. John. Daigle's seven-year-old daughter was with her father during the day and on several occasions the father sent the little girl to one of the liquor shops for a new supply of the diluted alcohol. When Daigle started for his home at nightfall he was in a limp and wobbly condition and could barely sit on the seat of his cart. When well out of the St. Francis road he attempted to race with a team that passed him, regardless of his own safety or that of his child. All at once the cart struck a rock and Daigle was pitched to the ground, carrying the child with him. He had been holding her in his arms. The man fell heavily upon the little girl, one of his elbows striking her violently in the chest. She died in a few moments without recovering consciousness. Father and child were hauled home together, Daigle intoxicated and stunned by his fall, his little victim bruised and dead at his side. The scene was too much for the poor wife and mother and she was seized with violent hysterics from which she suffered during two whole days, and only by great effort did the neighbors prevent her from killing herself. She is still in a critical condition and her grief is heartrending.

Daigle is utterly broken down and has been to the priest and forsworn liquor for all the rest of his life.

**Government Stock.**

The government importation of thoroughbred cattle for stock and breeding purposes arrived in Fredericton on Friday night. The government commissioners, Hon. L. Ferris, Mr. Smith, M. P. P., and Mr. Peters, new secretary of agriculture, left Fredericton on the 19th of August, and therefore were away just one month. There was a delay of about ten days, caused by an examination of every animal for tuberculosis, by expert veterinarians. The stock, composing 120 head of cattle and 160 sheep, were all purchased in Ontario and Quebec. One bull, bought at the Toronto exhibition, came from New York, and was purchased because of his pedigree, he being a grandson of the famous cow, Pauline Paul. The herd was increased in the journey from Montreal by the birth of two calves, male and female, both Holsteins. The youngsters are smart and frisky, and are receiving lots of attention from the many visitors who have viewed the stock at the Agricultural Society's grounds.

The importation includes:—  
Ayrshire—36 bulls, 25 heifers.  
Shorthorn—15 bulls, 6 heifers.  
Jersey—13 bulls.  
Guernsey—4 bulls, 3 heifers.  
Holstein—8 bulls, 10 heifers.  
Hereford—3 bulls, 3 heifers.  
The 160 sheep comprise Shropshire, Cotswold, Lincoln, Dorset Downs and Leinster. The full pedigree of each animal will be published in catalogues to be issued. The sale will take place on Thursday Sept. 30th.

**Three Girls Burned to Death.**

Chatham, Ont., Sept. 27.—A terrible calamity befel a family named Heward, living at Port Alma, on the shore of Lake Erie, at 3 o'clock this morning, whereby three daughters of Presen Heward, a well-to-do farmer, lost their lives. The cause of the dreadful tragedy will never be known, but the supposition is that the fire which destroyed the dwelling and caused the death of the three girls, aged 16, 10 and 6 was by coals which had been thrown into an ash barrel adjoining the house. The members of the family yesterday prepared for the threshing, which was to have taken place to-day, and retired more tired than usual. This morning Mr. Heward awoke and found himself suffocating. He found the house a mass of flames, and escaped with his wife and three sons through the windows. One of the three girls remaining in the house was seen to rush back into the flames, attempting to save her sisters, and by this heroic deed sacrificed her life. By the position of the bones one of the girls was burned in the bed and the others while attempting to escape. The two boys are badly burned, and Mrs. Heward, who also rushed into the flames, in a vain attempt to save her daughters, is seriously, but not fatally, injured.

**Canadian Trade.**

OTTAWA, Sept. 18.—The Dominion trade returns for the month of August show an increase in both imports and exports. The total trade increase for the month is over a million dollars. For the two months of the fiscal year the increase in the total trade as compared with the two months last year is nearly five million dollars. The imports for August were \$11,546,225, as compared with \$11,083,875 for August, 1896, or an increase of \$462,350 in value. There was a decrease in the duty collected for the month of \$124,791, and for the two months of July and August of \$182,962. The return however, of Vancouver have not been received for two months, and when they are, they will add about \$55,000 to the revenue. The exports for the past two months were \$31,216,836, compared with \$26,015,964, in July and August, 1896, or an increase for the present year of \$5,200,872. The total trade was \$52,150,192, as against \$47,370,111 for July and August, 1896, or an increase of \$4,780,081 for the past two months.

A fellow came to me the other day and occupied my attention for about half an hour with a long string about family differences. His people hadn't used him right and he seemed to want to make a confident of the public. I warned him the public didn't give a royal cuss about him or his family, and if they had their little row, they had better fight it out among themselves. Then I turned to him and said, 'And noo, man d'ye believe in the deevil noo?' He made me however, just the same answer as before, and then I gave him up in despair.

Sometime ago we heard a good deal of a curling rink which was to be erected in Woodstock, and the gay game of curling-was to be the occupation during spare hours of our promising youth. Now, would seem to be the time for getting the thing a-going, but of late, I have not heard it so much as mentioned. It is not the fault of Woodstock young men, it is the fault of the age.
