FARMERS throughout the county are very busy getting in the harvest. In some sections quite a heavy frost is reported on Saturday night, and it is feared the corn may have suffered somewhat. Different accounts are given of the condition of the potato crop, from which much is expected, if it turns out well. Potatoes are reported to be selling as high as \$2.50 a barrel in Bangor, and if the price keeps up on the American side, it will soon come up here. Some farmers of this county report their potatoes doing well, others say that the rot has caused great havoc. The grain crop is, on the whole good. Altogether the outlook for better times for the farmer is good.

Better Times.

On all hands we hear the cheerful news that the worst of the long period of depression in business is passed, and that an era of prosperity is at hand. While consumers in cities and towns may feel alarmed that the price of flour and other eatables is coming up, experience has taught us that with farm produce high comes a general revival of business, and that while the purchasing power of a dollar may be less, the dollars are more plentiful. An authority on the wheat crop writes:—"The stocks afloat and in store in Europe are reported at 43,100,000 bu., or 3,100,000 bu. less than a year ago, while the stocks in America aggregate 43,973,000 bu. against 70,278,000 bu. at this time last year, making a total in Europe and America of only 87,123,000 bu., against 126,487,000 bu. on Sept. 1 last year—a deficiency in stocks of nearly 40,000,000 bu.—while the light output of European crops indicates that the wants of the importing countries the coming year will be unusually large. The American commercial agent in France advises the State Department that France will have to import 60,000,000 bu. of foreign wheat this year, and the American consul at Odessa says the Russian crop is so poor that the country will ship very little wheat, having raised but little more than will be needed at home. This was the consul's report, but some of the English houses on the board had advices from London reporting Russian offerings more liberal. But whatever Russia's crop may be, there seems to be no doubt that the European shortage is great, possibly greater than exporting countries can readily supply, and the failure of wheat to follow the European advance, as reported by cables, can hardly be explained, except upon the theory of dullness and apathy in the speculative trade. The wheat crop of Sicily and Calabria, according to the estimates of local agricultural newspapers, which are transmitted to the State Department by the United States Consul Brule, at Catania, will range from one-half to two-thirds of an average crop."

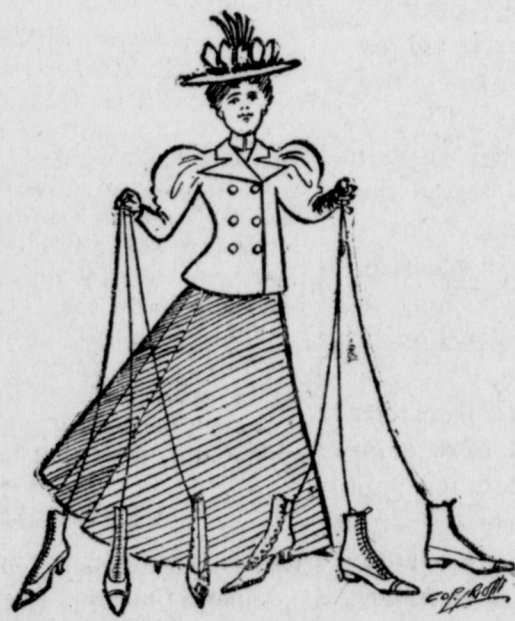
