

BACK TO ARKANSAS

Cook at The Selkire Mine Arrested For Murder.

J. Taylor was arrested Thursday at the Selkirk mine, and will be taken to Arkansas to be tried for a murder committed in 1892. About a week ago there arrived in Sandon a tall, keen featured man, wearing a long top coat and slouch hat, who seemed very willing to lister to what other people had to say, but when questioned himself was dumb as an oyster. This was L. C. Smith of Arkansas county, Ark., who has been on the track of the murder for several months, and with him was his deputy, R. N. Smith, who has kept very quiet. A warrant addressed to Const able Mountain came in the mail at the same time, and has been waiting the constable's return from Kamloops to be served. Thursday Officers Mouutain and Callin started up to get their man, after being cautioned by Sheriff Smith to take no chances and not to give the man time to make a move, as he was one of the most desperate criminals known in the southwest. The officers met A. J. Smith, president of the Selkirk company, coming down the trail and induced him to return, telling him that they wanted to see the property as well as to find out if the men had all paid poll tax.

Mr. Smith went back and at the bunk in the least inclined to be superstitious. house introduced the officers to the men. When Taylor was introduced Officer Mountain took his hand and demauded if he had paid his road tax. Before the astonished man could reply the officer had grabbed the other arm and Officer Callin had put the shackles on his wrsts, and he was told they had a warrest for his arrest. For a moment the man trombled all over and turned white, but soon recovered himself. He told the officers they were mistaken in the man, but made no effection to going with them. He was brought down to Sandon and then taken to Three Forks for the night. Friday he was started to Nelson to be taken before Judge McAdam, where papers are waiting to take him across the line and to the state where he is charged with one of the most causeless murders in that state's annals.

In June, 11892, Sheriff A. G. Byler of Baxter county, Ark., one of the northern countries, with a deputy were given a warrant for one Jesse D. Roper. The man was located in a sharty and Byler got off his horse and Roper saw him coming and shot him dead. since. UNLUCKY FRIDAY.

is it Really Unicky or is it only Childish Superstition?

Friday is supposed by many persons to be unfortunate per se, but to be especially un fortunate when it falls on the B3th of the month. A recent Friday fell on the 13th, and, in France especially, many persons commented on the fact and drew a gloomy augury therefrom. They meminded their meighbors that the 13th of every month was bound to be unlucky, and that on that day some of the most negrettable incidents in history had taken place. For example, this was the day on which the Due d'Aveire was executed, and on the same day many famous men breathed their last, among them being the Duc d'Epernon, the Duc deBerry, the Duc deCrequy, the painter LeBrun, the Chancellor de i'Hopital, Boilean and Montalembert. Moreover, on this same day Charlotte Corday stabbed Marat to death, Joachim Murat, King of Naples, was executed, and the Czar Alexander was assassinated by the nihilists. Finally, it is pointed out that Henry IV. was born on a Fridry, and on the 13th of the month, and that hence he was doomed to die a violent death.

Others go even further and insist that some hours of every day are unlucky. They claim that Gambetta believed in this doctrine and was wont to consult a celebrated card reader whenever he had an important enterprise in hand and desired to know the propitious time for beginning work. than once consulted a prophetess, and has heard some strange predictions from her lips' At any rate it is noted that he selected a fortunate hour for beginning his recent journey to Russia. Perhaps it was by accident, but all Parisians do not think so. Carnot, on the other hand, selected an unlucky hour for his fatal journey to Lyons, where, as all the world knows, he was assasinated by Caserio. He started on Saturday, June 23, 1894, at 10 in the morning, and the unlucky hours on every Saturday are said to be from 9 to 10.30.

Unlucky hours are known as Rak Kalon, and they are said to come in the following

Monday, from 7.30 to 9. Tuesday, from 3 to 4.30. Wednesday, from noon to 1.30. Thursday, from 1.30 to 3. Friday, from 10.30 to noon. Saturday, from 9 to 10.30. Sunday, from 4.30 to 6.

The assumption is that only the hours of the day are referred to here, though it is difficult to see why there should be any broad distinction between the hours of the day and those of the night. At any rate, attractive little cards have been printed in Paris setting forth these unfortunate hours, and they are said to be in great request among all who are

After all, there is nothing new in this doctrine of fortunate and unfortunate days and hours. For centuries such a belief has prevailed in the East, and in Persia today hardly any one will start on a journey or begin a new work without first finding out whether the hour and day are favorable. The origion of this belief can be easily explained. The ancient star readers held that each day of every week and each hour of every day were governed by a planet, and that according to the nature of that governing planet would be the nature of the day and hour. Thus the sun was supposed to rule Sunday, the moon Monday, Mars Tuesday, Mercury Wednesday, Jupitur Thursday, Venus Friday and Saturn Saturday. In like manner the hours were allotted to to the several planets, the sun ruling the first hour of Sunday, beginning at sunrise; Venus the second, Mercury the third, the moon the fourth, Saturn the fifth, Jupiter the sixth, Mars the seventh, and so on.

It may seem astonishing, but it is nevertheless true, that in this country, as well as in Europe, there are many persons who believe in this doctrine of fortunate and unfortunate days and hours. Few of those who believe may know the grounds on which the doctrine is based, but they believe nevertheless. Sailors always counted Friday and number 13 unlucky, and there are many persons besides sailors who are of the same

As a French paper, however, very sensibly remarks: "These superstitious persons do not fail to tell us of numerous instances in which Friday and the number 13 brought ill luck, and they are constantly assuring us that they would never dream of undertaking any important work on such a date. They utterly fail, however, to take into account numerous Fridays that have been signally fortagete and the number of persons to whom the number 13 brought great good luck. They tell us that Henry IV. was destined to die a violent death because he was born on Friday and on the £3th of the month, but they take no account of the many persons who have been born under the same conditions and who have died peaceably in their beds."
