S. of the University of Ada, Ohio, and is also a graduate of the Philadelphia Dental College. He is formerly from Richmond Corner, N. B. After their bridal trip they will settle in Lowell, Mass., where he will practise his profession.

THE community was shocked on Wednesday morning last at learning of the death of Mrs. Arthur J. Raymond which had occurred suddenly the night before. Mrs. Raymond was only taken seriously ill on Tuesday morning. She had been present at service in the parish church the previous Sunday. Her many friends could scarcely credit the sad news when it reached them. Deceased was the second daughter of Mr. C. T. Perkins. Her father, husband and two children survive her. She was a general favorite in the community which will long miss her. The funeral was held on Thursday afternoon, the officiating clergy, at Christ church being, Ven. Archdeacon Neales, Rev. Canon DeVeber and Rev. W. B. Belliss. The church was filled, and during the affecting service deep emotion was displayed by many of Mrs. Raymond's friends. The beautiful hymn "The radiant morn hath passed away" was sung by the choir and congregation. Among the mourners was Rev. Wm. Raymond of St. John, a brother-in-law of the deceased.

DISASTROUS FIRE. —Sidney Lloyd, living near Centreville, had all his buildings burned last Friday night. The fire burst out simultaneously in two of the barns at about eleven o'clock. Following is a partial list of Mr. Lloyd's losses: a house, three barns, woodshed, granary and hog house, 35 tons hay, 1000 bus. oats, 350 bus. buckwheat threshed, 25 bus. barley, 3 horses, one span being perhaps the finest span of farm horses in the county, 11 hogs, 1 Ayrshire calf, 1 farm wagon, 2 single wagons, 1 pung 2 plows, 2 harrows, 1 seed sower, 1 horse fork, 2 sets double harness, 2 sets single harness, 1 threshing machine, 1 double sled, 50 hens and quantities of other things that can't be thought of now. With the timely and generous assistance of his neighbours Mr. Lloyd saved most of his household furniture. The barns were burning so furiously when the fire was discovered, that nothing could be rescued from them. The loss is about \$4000. There was no insurance. The fire was beyond doubt the work of an incendiary and was started from two different places. Mr. Lloyd is a worthy man and a good citizen and has the sympathy of all his neighbours.

REV. BERNARD BARTON who has recently been working in the diocese of Qu'Appelle, N. W. territories has been appointed by Bishop Kingston to the charge at Canterbury, together with Benton and McAdam, and entered on his duties last Sunday. He held services in Trinity and St. Thomas, Canterbury.

THE change in the College building by which the Grammar school rooms have been enlarged, is made, and everything is complete. Several new desks have been put in. Teniers have been received for putting in the water closets in the schools, and will be considered at a meeting of the school board tomorrow morning.

ON THE AFTERNOON of the 12th Llewellyn Wilcox, of Mapleton, met with a very bad accident which results in the loss of his right hand. He was feeding a threshing machine and in some way his hand became caught in the beater of the machine, mangleing it in a horrible manner. He was at once brought to Presque Isle and Dr. Kilburn summoned, who amputated the hand at the wrist joint. Mr. Wilcox is a young man and has been married about two weeks. —Star Herald.

LATER. —The charred remains of two bodies were found and were identified as Peter Kelly and his wife, about 60 years of age. They were found about twenty-five yards from their residence on St. Ann's street and, evidently blinded by smoke, had wandered there directly in the fire. Their bodies were found side by side. Kelly was a tinsmith who worked with Jackson, near whose place the fire originated. Kelly belonged to Halifax, and was formerly one of the firm of Phelan & Kelly, tinsmiths.

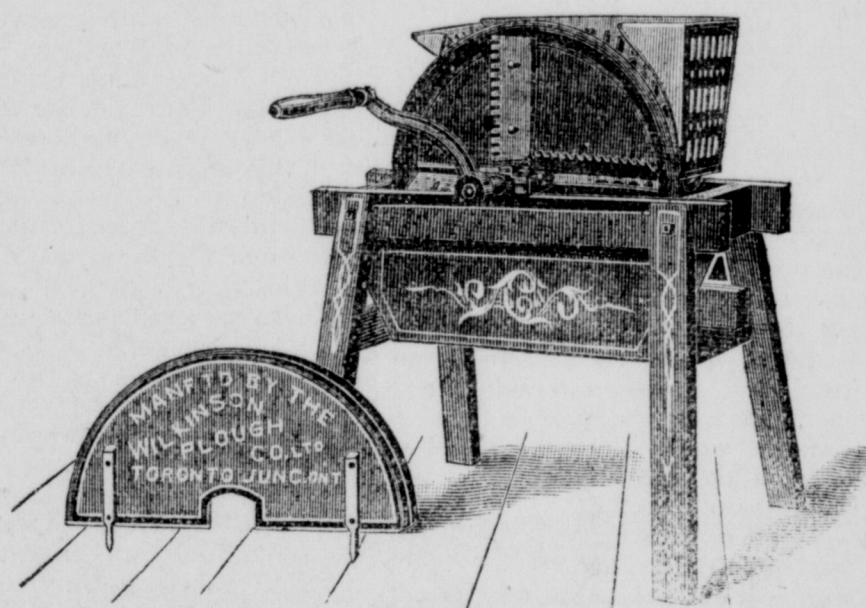
