I have no quarrel, nor disposition to quarrel with Mr. Phillips, and I regret that he has placed himself in the position he has, before the public. As a representative of the county I was forced to expose Mr. Phillips although I tried to help him out of the difficulty as much as I possibly could, and he promised me time and again to complete his work. President Case took the chair at 2.30 An excellent paper on Endeavor work was read by Mr. F. S. Hartley, on the subject of "Lift." This paper strongly emphasized the duty of Endeavorers to raise to a higher moral plane all with whom they come in contact. This paper elicited a spirited discussion by Rev. C. T. Phillips, W. C. Kierstead, J. P. Daggett, J. Nason, A. M. McNintch, J. W. Clarke and others. The committee to summarize reports as follows: Of 34 societies 26 have sent written reports, two have sent verbal reports, and six have given no reports. The verbal reports were Lower Prince William and Taylor Village. While these not reported are as follows: Beechwood, Seal Cove, Cummings' Cove, Canterbury, Arthurette and Upper Gagetown. There are nine more societies reported this year than last. The membership of the societies sending written reports is: Active, 758; associate, 330. Total, 1088. This shows an increase of 93 active members and over 85 associate over that of last year, but it must be kept in

Seventeen associate members have become active and united with the church, only onebetween April '91 and '95 if not paid before Sept. third the number of last year. As reported 1st 1897 will be left for collection. \$897.31 have been raised during the year. \$897.31 have been raised during the year, \$282.86 for orphanage; \$81 for foreign missions; \$533.45 for current expenses and home missions. This is \$20 less for the orphanage and \$30 less for missions than the 19 societies gave last year. One junior society has been organized during the year. The treasurer's report showed that \$4780 had been raised and there was now \$1,032 to




