RETIRING MILITIA OFFICERS.—Under a new regulation, in accordance with which commanding officers must retire after five years services as such, the following New Brunswick officers will have to hand over their commands to the next in rank: Major McLeod Vince, commanding Brighton Engineers, appointed 10th Sept 1874; Lt. Col. Domville, commanding 8th Hussars, appointed 2nd July, 1881; Lt. Colonel Dibblee, commanding Woodstock Field Battery, appointed 31st May, 1883; Lt. Colonel McCulley, 73rd Northumberland Battalion, appointed 12th June, 1885, and Lt. Colonel Baird, 67th Battalion, Carleton Light Infantry, appointed 16th September, 1887.

A COMMERCIAL TRAVELLER from Toronto was talking with THE DISPATCH the other day about the much discussed license. At one time, he said the city of Quebec, asked an annual license of \$60, and the result was that travellers made their head quarters at Levis, and gave all their patronage to that city, across the river from Quebec. The Quebec merchants used to come across and buy. He said that many travellers did not come to the place who would otherwise, particularly those working on commission. The travellers did not object so much to the tax itself, but the principle if right should be adopted in every municipality and that would mean the shutting out of the traveller altogether.

PLUNGED TO DEATH.

Horrible Tragedy on the Hudson.
GARRISON, N. Y., Oct. 25.—"The run" of the Buffalo special which started from the Bison city at 7.30 o'clock Saturday evening will never be finished. The engine that pulled the special and several cars lie in the river near here, or rest on the shore to which they have been lifted by wrecking crews. The last stopping place of the train was at Poughkeepsie.

When it drew out from the city at 5.15 on Sunday morning it was made up as follows: Engine and tender, express car, combination smoker and baggage car: day coach and six sleepers, the Gien Alpine, the Hermes, the Niobe, the latter taken on at Utica; the Diana taken on at Rochester. The Anita taken on at Syracuse and the Raquet River taken on at Albany.

The train was well filled and most of the passengers were asleep. Just after leaving Poughkeepsie at a point near Carrison the train plunged into the river. Only the last three cars, the sleepers, the Diana, Hermes, and Raquet River remained on the track. They were saved by the breaking of the couplings,

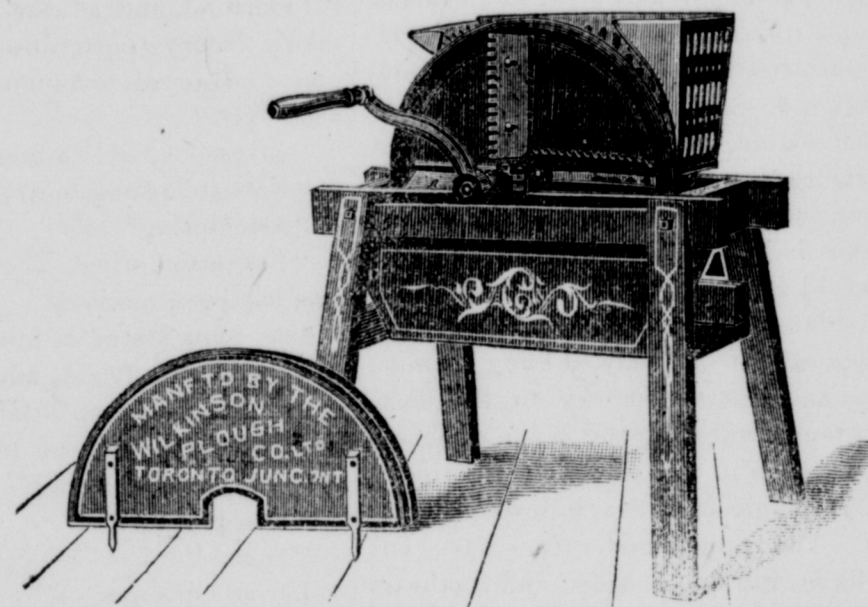
