DEFIED THE SPEAKER.

And then put out by the Sergeant-at-arms.

LONDON, May 28.—John Redmond, Parnellite leader, was suspended from the house of commons today, owing to his persisting in an irregular discussion of the financial relations between Great Britain and Ireland. John J. Clancy, member for the North Division of Dublin county; Wm. Redmond, member for West Clare; and Wm. Field, member for St. Patrick's Division of Dublin, for similar conduct, were removed from the house by the sergeant-at-arms. The disturbance took place during the committee vote for the maintenance of harbors. Mr. Clancy declared that Ireland was overlooked to keep up English establishments. The chairman said that statement was not relevant and called Mr. Redmond to order. Mr. Redmond arose and made the same statement. The chairman called him to order, and when Mr. Redmond persisted in speaking he was ordered to resume his seat. This he refused to do, whereupon he was named. The president of the Board of Trade, C. T. Ritchie, moved Mr. Redmond's suspension, which was adopted by a vote of 223 to 32. When the house resumed regular business the matter was reported to the speaker of the house, Wm. Court Gully, and the house confirmed the suspension by a vote of 238 to 52, several anti-Parnellites supporting the Parnellite minority.

The house then again went into committee and Mr. Clancy persisted on the same lines as Mr. Redmond. The chairman ordered him to withdraw. He refused to do so and the sergeant at-arms was ordered to remove him.

William Redmond shouted: "Send for the Horse Guards."

The sergeant-at-arms proceeded to Mr. Clancy's seat and immediately on his arrival there Mr. Clancy rose and withdrew with the sergeant-at-arms.

Mr. Redmond said: "Opinions may differ as to what is disorderly. I consider it not only disorderly but grossly criminal to not only rob a country but to gag its representatives. I shall take every opportunity of objecting to Ireland taking part in a single one of these votes under the present circumstances. It has been abundantly proved that Ireland is overtaxed."

The chairman here interrupted Mr. Redmond, and the latter persisting, was removed by the sergeant-at-arms.

Mr. Field, after having been repeatedly called to order, was told to withdraw, which he did, saying, "I obey."

The house in committee then calmly resumed discussion of the votes.

John Dillon, chairman of the Irish parliamentary party, presided today at a meeting of twenty-six Irish members of parliament, who adopted a resolution declaring that the Irish parliamentary party is unable to take part in the celebration of the jubilee, "on the ground that the demonstration is not simply commemorative of the private and public virtues of the monarch, but is mainly imperial jubilation over the development of the principles of self government and the growth of prosperity, wealth, comfort, etc., in which Ireland has not shared."

Hoboes Must Get Out.

Butte, Mon. May 30.—The numerous robberies committed in Butte lately reached a climax last night by the murder of William Krieger, when he resisted an attempted hold-up, and have aroused the old vigilance spirit in the people. As a preliminary to organization, a notice signed "Committee of Eight" was published here, addressed to the murderers, highwaymen and hoboes, warning them to leave this region within twenty-four hours, commencing at 6 o'clock to-night. The notice concludes: "Hoboes, whether innocent or guilty of crime, who go at once, will be considered innocent, but those who remain over the allotted time are guilty in our belief, and may God have mercy on their souls."

MUSINGS OF

Men and women pass out of this vale of tears every day of whom people and papers say good things. Their obituaries represent not what they were but what they should have been. It might not be a safe thing to write up a straight, true obituary of every man or woman who shuffles off the coil. The relatives of the deceased might call around with a gatling gun and destroy the office. I will just give you a sample of an obituary that would come into play very often under the truthful system.—Jamsie Sogan died last night—thank goodness—at the early age of 49. He looked fully 75, for he was a broken down and played out sport and it is a great wonder that he lived so long as he did. He did a good trade in prayer meeting, but no one took much stock in that, for he didn't pay his bills, he slandered his neighbours, would steal if he got a chance and it wasn't even safe to let him take up a collection in church. His wife and 19 children survive him and they are thankful for a few years of peace that is promised them. There were tears of joy in poor Mrs. Sogan's eyes as she saw Jamsie planted beyond any possibility of return. Now that she hasn't the old wretch to support she won't have to work so hard. The local endeavour planted onions and whisks on his grave. His enemies had sent large bunches of thistles and burdocks to express the disrespect in which he was held.

It would seem impossible that ignorance could suggest anything so absurd as this quoted below, but it is published as a genuine dispatch in an exchange:—"The amazing proposal recently made in sober earnest by the Scottish Sabbath Alliance is that cows be made to keep the Sabbath. The idea is that by docking the animal one feed in a week she would be able to dispense with the necessity of Sunday milking. By way of reinforcing the suggestion it is declared, in a report, that the experiment has been tried by a Christian employer of labor, with beneficial results."

Whatever conclusions a man may come to, honestly, he is deserving of respect, not censure bestowed by those who have neither ability nor energy to investigate and study.
